COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR.

To the Honorable Common Council:

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to return to you without approval an ordinance passed by the common council on the 19th instant, entitled "An ordinance relative to closing sa-titled "An ordinance relative to closing for loons, bars in restaurants and elsewhere, the reason that said ordinance permits the places designated to remain open during the months of July, August and September, until half past ten o'clock in the afternoon.

In my judgment all places where intoxicat-ing liquors are sold as a beverage should be closed not later than ten o'clock standard time, which means of course half past ten sun time. Nearly all the work of the world is per-formed by men who are in hed at that hour And it is safe to say that any person who is not willing to leave a saloon at half past ten and go home ought to be, and that the chances are he would be, if he had not already re-mained there too long.

I regret that there has been a misunderstanding as to my views upon this question. For such misunderstanding I am in a manner responsible. My attention was called to this matter by the chairman of the committee on ordinances in the city attorneys office at the time this ordinance was being drafted, and I stated then that I thought there was no objection to an extension of the time of closing during July, August and September. I have not spoken to the chairman upon this subject since. I saw the city attorney, however, soon afterwards and told him that such a measure was not defensible and requested him to notify the committee. I saw him a second time upon this same subject, and supposed that my posi-tion would not be left in doubt.
