REPORT OF CITY ATTORNEY ON PAYMENT OF THE ABOVE BILLS BY THE CITY.

Upon the questions referred to me I find the facts to be, that on November 20th, Mr. Collins gave to Fred H. Belser an order directed to Glen V. Mills, City Clerk, requesting him (Mills) to deliver to Belser an order for three thousand and seventy-five (\$3075.00) dollars from his next estimate.

Again on November the 21st a like order was given for three hundred and These were filed on the flfty (\$350.00). days they were given.

On November 21st an assignment was given by Colllins to the Farmers and Mechanics Bank of all money then due from the City of Ann Arbor to Collins to the extent of thirty-eight hundred and thirty-seven (\$3837.01) dollars and one cent, as being the amount of orders given by Collins for labor which were annexed to the as-This assignment and orsignment. ders were filed with the City Clerk on December 4th.

That beginning with the 22nd day of November a larger number of claims were filed with the City Clerk which arose for material and labor not assigned.

I find that the State Savings Bank has paid some of the orders issued by Mr. Collins, which claims were filed on December 6th.

The full amount of claims filed, including assignments, is eleven thousand two hundred and thirty-two dollars and seven cents (\$11,232.07). I am of the opinion that the assignment made November 21st Mr. assigned the money then due

bor and the City is bound to respect that assignment, if for no other reason than this: The City had no notice that Collins was indebted to any one for material, and even though if he was he would have the right to assign claims due to him from the City, especially when the money was used in furthering the work. The City is under no obligations to regard these claims filed against Collins for material for the reason that no contractual relations existed between the claimants and the City, and it does seem that they have, in some instances, been grossly negligent or else they rely upon the bond for material, for I am informed that one of the largest claims began with the contract and but little has been paid upon it.

The claimants certainly could not expect the City to protect them, when no information was furnished the City as to the amount of their claims when due and everything in regard to them.

The City could reasonably suppose that such claims were paid as the work progressed.

I am of the opinion that the City may legally pay the labor claims now due laboringmen if ordered paid by Collins, if the estimate warrants it taking into consideration the claim of Collins' assignee I would not advise the retention of any monies for the purpose of distribution under Section 113 of the specifications unless it be for labor. I would advise the payment of the monies as it falls due to Collins, his assignee, or to laborers upon his order.

For if the City retains money under the section alluded to we may be confronted with obstacles.

I would advise the Council to give the bondsman immediate notice of the condition of affairs; the fact that the contract not being completed,
