Formal complaint relating to the liquor bonds has been filed the Mayor's office.

It is stated that the qualifications of certain sureties do not meet the requirements of the law.

The Common Council having fixed the amount of the bond at \$3,000, each surety must justify in real estate. situated in Washtenaw county, in a sum equal to this amount. This property, too, must be worth \$3,000 over and above all indebtedness and all exemptions from sale or execution.

Such investigation as I have been able to make since receiving the complaints leads me to believe they are well founded. Many, perhaps all, of the bondsmen are worth more, counting personal property, than the requirements of the law demand. Others are owners doubtless of real estate situated without the county, but the streets, and on Fourteenth street be-

the Common terms of the statute are explicit, and I should be remise in duty if I did not call attention to the fact that certain bonds do not satisfy the laws of our state.
