Fischer presented "An ordinance granting to the Detroit, Ann Arbor and Adrian Railway Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Michigan, its successors and assigns, the right to construct, maintain, use, own and operate a street railway on certain streets, avenues and public places in the city of Ann Arbor, Washtenaw County, Mich.," which was given its first reading by title, and on motion of Ald. Fischer was passed to and given its second reading, two-thirds of the aldermen-elect voting therefor.

On motion of Ald. Fischer, "An ordinance relative to telephones and granting power and authority to J. W. Martin and his assigns to own, construct and operate a telephone plant and system in its corporate limit of the City of Ann Arbor," was passed to and given its second reading, two-thirds of the members elect voting therefor.

## SEWER.

To the Common Council:

Your Committee on Sewers to whom was referred the estimate and report of the City Engineer relative to the construction of the lateral sewer in Lateral Sewer District No. 10, beg leave to report that we have had such estimate and report and as well the resolution of the Common Council under consideration, and have made due inquiry relating thereto; that we have patiently heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewer; that a special taxing or assessment district ought to be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the cost of the construction of such sewer may be charged, street crossings excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided
