Ordinance entitled An Ordinance relative to changing the course and grade of certain streets and elevating the tracks of the Ann Arbor Railroad."

Ald. Fischer moved that the ordinance be passed to its second reading. Adopted as follows:

Second reading of the ordinance:

An Ordinance to amend Sections One, Four, Five and Six, of an Ordinance entitled: "An Ordinance Relative to Changing the Course and Grade of Certain Streets and Elevating the Tracks of the Ann Arbor Railroad."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That section one of an ordinance changing the course and grade of certain streets and elevating the tracks of the Ann Arbor Railroad granted October 1, 1902, and approved October 6, 1902, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the established grade at the points of intersection of said road company's tracks on the following named streets be: At Summit street, 4.6 feet; at Liberty street, 10 feet; at First street, 4 feet above the grade line at the points at which the said railroad company's tracks cross said streets at their centers May 11, Also that the grade of Cedar 1903.and Wright streets be established at 2.2 feet; Pontiac street, 3.3 feet; and of Jones and Traver streets, 3.1 feet below the surface of said streets, as they were October 1, 1902, at the points where said railroad crosses said several streets."

Section 2. That section 4 of said ordinance be and it is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"That said railroad company shall, at its own expense, construct the necessary approaches on First and Lib erty streets, and Summit street on both sides of said crossings, at a grade not exceeding six feet to the hundred, so graded as to make the same in every way suited for public travel,

and to provide and maintain suitable and safe planking for said crossings."

Section 3. That section 5 of said ordinance be, and is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the preceding sections of this ordinance shall be null and void un-less said Ann Arbor Railroad Company shall provide and place steel viaducts on suitable stone, cement, or iron abutments, at Felch street, Miller Huron and Washington streets, which shall extend the full width of said several streets, with the support at the curb lines, if desired. and shall carry all the tracks, both main and side tracks, over these streets, except as hereinafter provided, and shall give a clear minimum headroom above present surface, 12 feet at Felch street, 15 feet at Miller avenue, 14 feet at Huron street and 13 feet at Washington street.

Provided, That the said Ann Arbor Railroad shall have the right to cross Washington, Felch and Liberty streets with one side track on the present grade of each and that during the hours when such side track is in use the said railroad company shall station and keep at said crossings a flag-

man.

That the elevation of said tracks shall be completed on or before October 1, 1904."

Section 4. That section 6 of said ordinance be, and is hereby amended to read as follows:

"The aceptance of this ordinance by said railroad company shall be an agreement on the part of said company and said company thereby undertakes to do all said work provided for in sections one and two of this ordinance at its own cost and expense; to indemnify and hold harmless the City of Ann Arbor from any and all costs and liabilities by reason thereof, either to abutting property owners or others; to do said work under the supervision and to the entire satisfaction of the City Engineer of the City of Ann Arbor; and to keep and maintain said crossings and approaches thereto at all times in a suitable and safe condition for public travel."

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the expiration of ten (10) days from the legal publication thereof and

the filing of the written acceptance thereof by the Ann Arbor Railroad Company.

The ordinance was then on motion referred to the Ordinance Committee.

#### Report of City Attorney.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:

The matter of the Gertlemen: taxes for the year 1900 due the city from the Ellis Estate referred to me at your meeting of August 31, I submit the following report:

In the year 1900, at the time the assessment was made, there was left forty thousand five hundred (\$40,500.00) in the Ellis Estate undis-Thirteen thousand five huntributed. dollars (\$13,500.00) amount was government bonds, which are not taxable, and stocks upon which the taxes were paid by the corporations that issued them. This left a balance of twenty-seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$27,500.00) in the estate subject to taxation. The rate of taxation in this city for the year 1900 was \$14.54 on a thousand dollars, and the taxes on \$27,500.00 was \$399.85. I have settled the matter with H. P. Elhs, of Paris, Texas, on this basis, and received his draft for this amount and deposited the same with the City Treasurer.

The matter of the claim of the city against lots A, B and C of Orr's subdivision for \$63.60 for sewer and water connections I report that I have collected this claim and deposited the money with the City Treasurer.

The matter of the telephone pole in front of the residence of Mr. Lawrence, I report that I consulted with Mr. Keech and Mr. Land, general superintendent of the telephone company, and they promised to remove the box that was objectionable, not only on this pole but on all other poles in the city, and I am informed that the same are removed.

The report of the City Marshal for the month of September was received and placed on file. The Mayor's veto, which had been deferred from a previous meeting, was taken up as follows:

To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen: I wish to record my disapproval of so much of your proceedings of Monday, September the 14th, as relates to the coping and paving of the gutters on either side of West Liberty street lying between Ashley and First street for the following reasons:

First. The charter of our city does not permit the doing of this work in the manner or ered and can only be done by advertising and letting to the lowest bidder and after appropriation of sufficient money to do the work.

Second. The citizens of Ann Arbor have been engaged in doing this kind of work, that is beautifying their residences and the streets of the city by extending their lawns and coping and paving their gutters at their own expense for a long number of years, and it would be radically unfair and unjust to the thousands who have already paid for this work to now be compelled to assist others in beautifying their private property by extending lawns, setting coping and paving the gutters in front of their houses.

Third. For the reason that the three hundred dollars required for this work can better be expended in graveling our streets and making them safe for public travel.

Fourth. For the reason that this would be a very dangerous precedent to establish and if the city was to enter upon this kind of work and spend the public monies for this purpose there would be no one left in the city who has not already beautified and protected their homes by the extension of lawns and the coping and pavement of gutters who could not consistently ask the Council to do this work for them, and if the Council was asked to do this by others, what reply would your Honorable Body make to such a request when there are at least a hundred other places in the city where this kind of work could be done and where would the city get the money with which to do this kind of work?

And finally, there is no necessity to try this expensive experiment for the purpose of learning whether or not a cement curbing is durable for the reason that many private citizens have put in and built in front of their property here in this city this same cement curbing this year and it will soon be demonstrated without cost to the city, whether the same is durable or not.
