Communication from Mayor.

To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen:

On March the 21st last you passed an ordinance and franchise granting to the Michigan Milling Company the right to construct, own and operate an electric light plant in this city.

I have been informed by the City Clerk and by certain members of the Council that before the final vote was taken upon the passage of this ordinance, that certain officers and directors of the Michigan Milling Company promised and agreed to file an agreement in writing with the City Clerk agreeing to release the City from any and all claims for damages that said Michigan Milling Company might have against said city on account of the passage of the so-called separation of grade ordinance.

Under the charter of our city all ordinances are to be signed by the Mayor within ten days from the time the same is presented to him for approval, and unless signed or vetoed on that date, the ordinance becomes operative without the approval of the Mayor.

The officers of the Michigan Milling Company informed me this morning that they had been advised by their attorney that if they signed such agreement as they promised to sign on the 21st before the passage of said ordinance, agreeing to release the city from any claims for damages by way of

grade separation, that such action would also release the Ann Arbor Railroad Company, and that as they believed they had a just cause to complain against the action of the Railroad Company, that they felt that they would be doing an injustice to themselves to sign such an agreement.

Therefore for the purpose of holding said matter in abeyance until the next meeting of this council, I hereby disapprove of so much of your proceedings of March the 21st last as relates to the passage of this ordinance.

If the advise of the Milling Company's attorney is correct and if an agreement to release the City from any damages by the way of grade separation from the Milling Company will also operate to release the Ann Arbor Railroad Company, then it is possible that your Council ought not to insist upon the signing of such an agreement, for if the Milling Company have a just cause to complain against the action of the railroad company, they ought to be permitted to persue their remedy.

Several of the officers of the Milling Company including H. S. Dean, D. F. Allmendinger, N. J. Kyer and Andrew R. Peterson, have all personally informed me that they have no intention of bringing any suit against the City on account of said grade separation and that the Milling Company will not bring any suit or other proceedings against the City on account of said matter.

Personally I have no objection to the franchise that was granted to them except that I do not think that the provisions of said franchise in reference to the under-ground wires is at all effective, but if this provision is satisfactory to the members of your Council, I have no objections to it, and as stated above I take this action simply for the purpose of holding the matter until your Honorable body can consider it again, for the Milling Company insist that they cannot with safety to themselves, sign such an agreement as they agreed to at the time of

the passage of said ordinance and found all regularly filled out and filed. Tranchise. We further report that we had the

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on streets have been out inspecting several places where the conditions of things should be changed.

They are as follows:

Allen's Creek should be straightened from the west side of Main street to the south side of Madison street; and the same to be built out of concrete according to the opinion of your Committee, and we would recommend that the Engineer make an estimate upon the cost of same and present it at the next council meeting.

We would also recommend that the water course on Gott street, corner of Hiscock street be changed so as to take a more direct course into the ravine on Hiscock street and that the City Engineer make an estimate on extending a 24 in. sewer pipe from Hiscock street to Pearl street.

Your Committee also visited Charles street at the point where it crosses the Ann Arbor Railroad and they found that the crossing there at the present time, is very dangerous, in fact, unsafe for public travel and would recommend that either Charles street be opened up for safe traveling or open up a new street from Summitto Chubb

streets so as to give better accomodations to the people on Chubb street and the Catholic cemetery.

We would also recommend that William street be graded and graveled from First to Fourth street.
