COMMUNICATIONS FROM MAYOR.

Sept. 21, 1904.

To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:

Gentlemen:

I hereby disapprove of so much of your proceedings of September 19th as relates to the construction of a pavement on Ashley street, for the following reasons:

First.—Because the specifications called for the use of a cement filler and I believe that it is now too late in the season to commence the work on said pavement, and that the work should be commenced at a time in the year when it can be completed before there is any danger of damage by frost.

Second.—Because I believe that the price paid or to be paid for the construction of said pavement is at least \$1,200 too high.

Third.—Because I think if the work is delayed until next year that such amendment to our charter as is necessary to enable the city to do this work, can be obtained, and many dollars saved to the taxpayers by so doing.

I approve of the paving of the street and I also approve of the material specified, but for the reasons above given I think the work should be delayed until another year.

ORDINANCE COMMITTEE.

An Ordinance to amend sections one and two of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to the licensing of dogs and regulating the running at large and the slaying of dogs," passed September 17, 1894; approved September 18, 1894.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. That Sections one and two of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance relative to the licensing of dogs and regulating the running at large and the slaying of dogs," passed September 17, 1894; approved September 18, 1894, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, possess or harbor, or have the care or keeping of any dog,

male or female, over the age of three months, within the City of Ann Arbor, without first obtaining a license therefor from the said City of Ann Arbor. The fee for which license shall be: For a male dog and a spayed female dog, one dollar and twenty-five cents; for a female dog, five dollars. No license shall be granted for a period exceeding one year, and all licenses shall expire on the first day of July succeeding their issue.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of every person owning or having the possession or care of any dog, male or female, to cause such dog to be registered in the office of the city clerk, in a register kept by said clerk for that purpose, and to pay the license fee provided in Section 1 of this ordinance, into the city treasury; and also to obtain the city clerk's receipt for said license so paid and the metallic plate or check hereinafter described, under the penalties herein provided.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force, on and after ten days from the legal publication.
