To the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your committee on walks have had under careful consideration the several questions referred to them, and would recommend as follows: That it is deemed and declared a necessary public improvement to order a tar walk along the southwest side of Packard street in front of all the property between Mr. Chauncey Thompson to and including lot belonging to Mr. Isaac N. Jackson.

We further deem it necessary to build a six-foot stone or cement walk along the fire engine house on west side of Fifth avenue, with suitable brick driveway.

Also that the present tar walk on the west side of Fifth avenue be rebuilt between Huron and Washington street, and proper brick drainage provided.

That an estimate of the material, cost and dimensions suitable for a water course across Packard street be furnished by the engineer to discharge into the newly platted Rogers street from East University.

Engineer on Sanitary Sewer No. 14.

Gentlemen—I have had the petition of Dr. Warthin asking for a sanitary sewer, which was referred to me, under consideration and recommend that a sanitary sewer district be laid out, to be known as District No. 14.

This sewer will begin at the intersection of Baldwin and Israel avenues and extend easterly on Israel avenue to Washtenaw avenue; thence southeasterly on Washtenaw avenue to Ferdon road; thence southerly on Ferdon road as far as the topography of the ground will permit.

This recommendation is based on the assumption that Ferdon road will be accepted by the city.
