Gentlemen:—Your committee appointed April 16, 1906, to refer the recommendations of the Special Committee to the Board of Fire Commissioners, beg leave to report as follows:

On April 23, 1906, your committee met with the Board of Fire Commissioners at Station No. 1 and submitted to said board the following recommendations:

1st. That Mr. Whitlinger be reinstated as a fireman. To this request the answer was there is no vacancy, but when your committee asked the commissioners if there would not be vacancy soon, Mr. Seabolt said "Well, we might as well be fair boys." And then Mr. Apfel said, "Mr. Whitlinger will never go back on the fire Your committee then department." asked the fire commissioners the question: "Why not?" This brought Mr. Apfel to his feet and, aided by Mr. Seaboit, Mr. Apfel proceeded to give the council, the special committee and the fire committee a severe scoring. He, Mr. Apfel, said it was an outrage. a disgrace and a damned insult to the fire commissioners for the council to make an investigation after the fire commissioners had done their work and done it well.

Your committee does not believe that the work done by the fire commissioners in the Sipley-McLaren-Whitlinger altercation was done well, but on the contrary we have good reason to believe it was done for the benefit of the parties interested at the expense of the third one.

The only reason given by the fire commissioners for discharging Whitlinger and refusing to reinstate him was that he used vile language and for that reason they did not consider him a good man for the depart-Your committee then asked ment. the commissioners why they did not discharge the chief of the department for using the same language and striking the first blow in this altercation. This question the fire commissioners did not answer and probably never will, but right here Mr. Apfel gave your committee to understand that the fire commissioners were supreme.

2d. As to raising Mr. Carroll's salary the fire commissioners thought this was a good move and Mr. Apfel said the fire commissioners had thought of doing the same thing, but why they never did your committee is unable to state.

3d. As to the equipment, we find the truck department in bad shape, the truck broken and the back wheels have become so weak that they are unsafe. The ladders are in bad shape, those that are not broken have been weakened by tightening up the bolts and drawing the heads into the wood

so far that they are unsafe. There is not a ladder in the department that would reach the fourth story window of the Cook house or any other four story building in our city and in case of fire and the fire escape and exit being cut off anybody unfortunate enough to be on those floors would be cremated. This your committee think a deplorable state of affairs. The hose wagons are in very good condition. The hose is in good condition.

4th. As to drill the fire commissioners think this a good thing and have instructed Chief Edwards to drill the

men as often as possible.

5th. As to giving the men every eleventh day, this the commissioners favored providing it can be done without impairing the service of the department.

That on Apr I 27, 1906, your committee met at Station No. 1 on Huron street, to inspect the building lound the following conditions: floors are in bad shape dowstairs and new ones should be laid; the outer door trames in this part of the buildiug are rotten next to the brick work and let the doors drag, if the doors are closed when the department is called out it requires a man at each door to open them. Those doors should open automatically so as soon as the horses are hitched the men could get on the wagon instead of

also found the walls and ceiling in the lower part of this department needs The walls in the reading painting. and sleeping rooms should be painted. also the wall and the ceiling in the nall upstairs and in the main entrance denwstairs needs a coat of paint. We also found that the sanitary condition of the bath room is bad, so bad that the department have been forced to put a ventilator in the ceiling of the room and another in the attic to get rid of the foul air. This could be overcome by spending a few dollars for a new closet.

We also found the department has no apparatus for fighting a large fire, the largest nozzle is inch which would not make a black mark in a big fire. This deficiency your committee will recommend to be taken care of at once.

We also learned that on April the 23d, at 4:00 a.m., this department was called to a fire on Miller avenue. When they reached this fire the chief found there was only one nozzle out of the three that was on the hose wagon that would fit the hose. was the first fire that Chief Edwards had been called upon to respond to after being placed in charge of the de-Both wagons were loaded partment. with this new hose in the Huron street department and only one nozzle that would fit, the rest had to be taken to a machinist and cut down to fit.

These are a few of the conditions existing in our fire department which your committee wish to submit for your consideration.

City Attorney's Report.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen:—It seems proper at this time to make some report concerning the litigation now pending in which the city is interested.

Nine cases are pending, growing out of claims for alleged damages by reason of the disastrous flood which occurred in the city on the 7th day of July, 1902. These cases are as follows:

Henry Richards vs. the City of Ann Arbor.

John M. Bird and Florence E. Bird vs. the City of Ann Arbor. Ella L. Schroeder vs. the City of

Ann Arbor.

George A. Smith and Ellen A. Smith vs. the City of Ann Arbor.

Adolph P. Kern vs. the City of Ann Arbor.

Lawrence T. Sutter vs. the City of Ann Arbor.

George W. Sweet vs. the City of Ann Arbor.

Thomas J. Keech vs. the City of

Ann Arbor. It is reported that a number of oth-

er suits will be brought by various parties for the same alleged cause of action.

All of the above mentioned cases are on the docket for the present term of court, except the case of Thomas J. Keech vs. the city.

Another case which is on the docket at the present term of court is the case of Lorne A Webb vs the City of Ann Arbor, asking for a permanent injunction restraining the city from enforcing the provision to the Street Ordinance Relative to Signs.

The case of John McNally and Nettie E. McNally vs. the City of Ann Arbor and the Ann Arbor Railroad Company is also on the docket at the present term of court. This is a damage suit wherein the claim is made that the city and the railroad company were jointly negligent in the matter of a change of grade on Traver street.

In the case of Chas. A. Sauer et al vs. the City of Ann Arbor, asking for a permanent injunction restraining the city from enforcing its ordinance relative to the regulation of skating rinks, a temporary injunction has been issued restraining the city from enforcing said ordinance, and the demurrer to the bill has been overruled. It is now open to the city to either appeal to the supreme court, or to file an answer and contest the matter on the mertis in the circuit court.

Pursuant to the authority given by the council, proceedings have been commenced to condemn the land lying east of Broadway and between the Michigan Central right of way and the Huron river for purposes of a public common or park. As soon as service of process can be obtained on all the parties interested in this land, the matter can be brought on for hearing in the circuit court. It is probable that the matter can be disposed of during the month of June.

The Ann Arbor Water Company has filed its bill of complaint, asking for an injunction to restrain the city from enforcing the ordinance fixing the rates to be charged by the Water Company. The court has authorized a temporary injunction in this suit.
