Whereas, the Ann Arbor Water Co. has given the city of Ann Arbor an option to buy its plant, including all real estate, said option not expiring until August 1, 1912, and

Whereas, the Ann Arbor Water Co. at present owns a plot of land described as lots 3 and 10, and the west half of lots 2 and 11, all in block 4 of J. D. Baldwin's Eastern addition to Ann Arbor, having bought said land for the purpose of erecting a water tower thereon, and

Whereas, the undersigned own all of the rest of said block 4, and are desirous of obtaining the land at present held by the said Ann Arbor Water Co. in order to use this land on which to build their residences, and

Whereas, the undersigned also own lots 9, 10 and 11 in block 2 of J. D. Baldwin's Eastern addition, which, in the opinion of the engineers of the city and the Water Co., are just as desirable for the location of the water tower as the land at present held by the Ann Arbor Water Co., and

Whereas, the undersigned have offered to give the Ann Arbor Water Co. a clear title to lots 9, 10 and 11, in block 2, in exchange for lots 3 and 10 and the west half of lots 2 and 11 in block 4, all in J. D. Baldwin's Eastern addition to the city of Ann Arbor, and

Whereas, if any exchange is to be

made, it must be done at once, as it is necessary that the Ann Arbor Water Co. let the contract for the excavation for the foundation of the water tower, and for their pipe immediately, in order that the construction may be completed in June.

Therefore the undersigned respectfully request the common council of the city of Ann Arbor to instruct the Ann Arbor Water Co. that it has no objection to this exchange of properties, subject to the approval of the Engineer of the City.

Annual Report of Fire Department.

To the honorable board of fire commissioners. Gentlemen—I herewith submit the 23rd annual report of fire department, April 1st 1911 to March 31, 1912.

Station No. 1.—One steam fire engine, complete, with heater, tools, etc. Drawn by two horses. Hose wagon, 1,000 ft. 2 1-2 in hose, 2 3-gal fire ext., fully equipped with all tools, pipes, etc. 2 horses. Aerial truck, 65 ft. ext. ladder, 40 ft. ext. 30 ft., 24 ft., 20 ft., 16 ft., 12 ft., and roof ladder. Two 3-gal fire ext. all necessary tools. Drawn by 3 horses. Chief's wagon used for all chimney and grass fires, inspecting hydrants, buildings, etc. Supply and exercise wagon, carrying coal, rope, chains, deluge set, etc. Reserve hose wagon, 1,000 ft. 2 1-2 in. hose. Complete tools, pipes, etc. Hook and ladder truck, 60 ft. ext. 40 ft. ext. 28 ft., 20 ft., 16 ft., 14 ft., and roof ladder. Two 6-gal fire ext. tools, etc. Hose in reserve, 1869 ft. good 2 1-2 in, 1170 ft, old 2 1-2 in, 100 ft. good 3 in. Horses. We have ten all in good condition. One is old and will soon have to be replaced. Harness. We have three double set. One 3-horse hitch. One single. One extra. Horse barns are furnished complete with blankets, whips, sponges, forks, shovels, combs, brushes, etc. Supplies on hand: 1-2 ton hay, 180 bu. oats, 2 ton straw, 200 lbs bran, 20 lbs oil meal, 27 brooms, 2 bits, 39 sponges, 5 chamois skins, 1-2 gal polish, 15 lbs soda, 21 bot. acid, 9 gal. disinfectant, 40 gal. oil, 17 spanners, 200 N. S. calks, 29 rubber gaskets, 7 box matches, 1 gold dust, 3 D cleaner, 127 bar Ivory soap, 30 toilet paper, 24 roller towels, 45 small towels, 12 bath towels, 54 pillow slips, 52 sheets. Station No. 2.—Combination wagon 1,000 ft. 2 1-2 in hose, 50 gal. chemical tank, 200 ft. 3-4 chem. hose, 2 3-gal. ext. fully equipped, short ladders, tools, pipe, etc. Extra hose. 1,000 ft. 2 1-2 in good, 1 exercise wagon, 1 sleigh. Supplies on hand, 1-2 ton hay, 30 bu. oats, 11 bales straw, 50 lbs bran, 2 gal acid, 50 lbs soda, 25 tar soap, 15 Ivory soap, 50 toilet paper, 142 box matches, 1-2 keg dust down, 3 gold dust, 13 pillow slips, 22

sheets, 17 small towels, 16 roller towels.

Recommendations.

I would recommend that one auto engine be purchased at once for the east and south part of city and change all apparatus to motors as soon as possible. Taking the expense account from other cities, which are using autos we could save from \$2,500 to \$3,000 per year. The Sixth ward engine house is in very poor condition and should be repaired or rebuilt for an auto engine.
