Ann Arbor, Mich., July 15, 1912.

To the Hon. Common Council: Gentlemen—In accordance with your instructions of July 1, 1912, I have made surveys and looked up records in regard to the ownership of property on the east side of Lincoln av., running south from Hill st. To the best of my knowledge and belief, the hedge along this lot is out on the city's property, as shown on the drawing herewith and marked QXGH-165A, and should the sidewalk be placed at the proper distance from the property line and made to conform with the sidewalks further south along the east side of this street the hedge will have to be cut down or moved back onto private property. special election be and the same is hereby called and will be held on Tuesday, August 27, 1912, in pursuance of the State law and charter of this city, to vote upon the question of raising the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25 000.00) by loan, such funds when raised to be used for the purpose of constructing a detention hospital, said hospital to be erected upon a site to be furnished by the University of Michigan.

On condition that the city of Ann Arbor will furnish and turn over to the Regents of the University of Michigan, \$25,000.00 for the purpose of building a contagious disease hospital in said city, the University of Michigan agrees to furnish a site for the same, build a hospital to cost at least the aforesaid amount, and will equip and maintain it in perpetuity, furnishing necessary medical attendance and nursing.

Such hospital shall be open at any and all times for the reception of any patients taken sick in the city of Ann Arbor with a contagious disease. The number of such patients shall be limited only by the full capacity of such hospital. The rates charged by the University shall always be in accordance with those charged other patients in the other University hospitals of Ann Arbor, Michigan, receiving similar accommodations.

When such hospital shall not be in use, either in whole or in part, for the care of contagious disease patients, the University shall be free to make use of such part of it as is not occupied as the Regents may see fit, rules for the control of the hospital

shall be made by the Board of Regents.

Resolved, further, that said election be held in the several wards of the city of Ann Arbor, Mich., as follows: 1st ward, ward voting room, basement of the city hall; 2nd ward, ward building on S. Ashley st.; 3rd ward, ward building on Miller av.; 4th ward, voting room in basement of new armory, cor. Ann st. and Fifth av.; 5th ward, ward building, cor. Swift and Pontiac sts.; 6th ward, basement of 6th ward school, E. University av.; 7th ward, ward building on Mary St.

Resolved, further, that the city clerk of said city be and is hereby authorized to issue the usual call for said special election pursuant to the State law and charter of said city, and to cause to be printed ballots for the use of the electors at said election, which ballots shall be printed upon white paper of equal width and length and shall read:

"FOR THE DETENTION HOSPITAL SPECIAL TAX—YES

"FOR THE DETENTION HOSPITAL SPECIAL TAX—NO."

Resolved, further, that the canvass and termination of the vote of said special election be made pursuant to the State law and charter of the city.

Resolved, further, that the polls for said election be open from 7 o'clock, A. M., to 8 o'clock P. M.
