Resolved, further, and it appearing to this common council that to enable the city of Ann Arbor, during the fiscal year aforesaid, to keep, maintain in good condition, order and repair the several bridges, culverts, sidewalks and crosswalks, within the corporate limits of said

city, a sum of money in excess of the per centum authorized to be raised under the authority of the city charter is and will be necessary, therefore,

Resolved, that by virtue of the authority granted to the common council by the general laws of the state, the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) be and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of maintaining in good order and repair the several bridges, culverts, sidewalks and crosswalks, within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor.

Resolved, further, and it is hereby ordered, that the several sums of money aforesaid be and the same are hereby levied and assessed upon, on and against the taxable property of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and ordered spread on the tax rolls of the city for the year 1913 and 1914, A. D., for the several purposes aforesaid, and it is hereby ordered that the several sums be assessed, levied and collected and paid to the City Treasurer for the several funds aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the city clerk do certify this resolution and order of appropriation and assessment to the city assessor, and that when so certified the city assessor do spread the said several sums of money aforesaid on and upon the tax rolls of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan, for the year 1913-1914, and assess the same against the taxable property of the city of Ann Arbor as the same has been set down in the tax rolls or as the same may be fixed or determined by the board of review of the said city against the respective owners and occupants of the said taxable property pursuant to law.

Resolved, further, that the foregoing appropriations are deemed necessary and for public improvements.

Groves: Whereas, about one year ago the Board of Public Works declared its intention to and did experiment with various bitumens for surfacing our concrete pavements; now, therefore, Resolved that said board be requested to report to this council the result of these experiments, giving name of material used and cost per gallon. Resolved, further, that said board make recommendations regarding material for the coming season, and to make purchase of same upon orders of this council.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Schultz presented the following ordinance for its third reading:

"An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance Entitled an Ordinance Relative the Management and Control of Fair View Cemetery," passed January 9th, 1905; approved January 17th, 1905.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain;

Sec. 1. That section 4 of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative the Management and Control of Fair View Cemetery," passed January 9th, 1905 and approved January 17th, 1905 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. All persons desiring to bury friends or relatives in Fair View Cemetery must file an application with the city clerk for a burial permit, such application to be accompanied by a fee of Five Dollars for an Adult, Three Dollars for a child from the age of five years to twelve years, and Two Dollars for a child under five years of age, to cover the expense of digging and filling and sodding the grave. The following charge shall be paid the city clerk for use of the receiving vault: Two Dollars for the first fifteen days, and twenty-five cents per week thereafter for all persons over twelve years of age; One Dollar for first fifteen days and twenty-five cents per week thereafter for all persons not over twelve years of age. Provided, however, that if a body is placed in the vault for the convenience of the Sexton no charge for such time shall be made.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

Resolved, further, that the City Engineer cause all needful surveys, maps, measurements and estimates to be made, and report to the council with all convenient dispatch.
