To the President and Members of the Common Council of Ann Argor: Gentlemen-I call your attention to a matter which surely is of deep interest to you and every member of this community.

Every winter Ann Arbor is visited with epidemics, more or less severe, of grip, influenza, sore throats and kindred ailments. I have consulted the health officer and other prominent physicians of this city, and questioned them as to what extent necely ventilated public places were responsible for these epidemics. The answer invariably was, "To a very large extent."

I do not wish to single out particular place of amusement. merely call your attention. gentlemen, to a matter which is of vital importance. Investigate for yourselves.

Many of our public places of amusement are in such a condition for want of proper ventilation that every one who goes there and sits out an entertainment of two or more hours, especially if his system is in the least run down, takes his life in his We are all too squeamish in hands. such matters. We dislike to be considered "fussy," yet we spend thousands of dollars and a large amount of time (and properly) investigating "tuberculosis" and other dangerous diseases, overlooking the headquarters for the spreading of many of them. Think of it! Public places filled with poisonous air, often crowded to excess by one or two thousand Thos. O'Brien, salary 40.00

breathing and rebreathing this foul air for two more hours at a time, many of these people having severe colds, grip, con-Ald. Schultz, sumption and other troubles, then wonder why we have epidemics every winter.

A silly reply might be made, "A person doesn't have to go to such places." I answer, the average person doesn't think of those things, or, worse yet, takes the risk, overlooking the fact that every person who contracts such diseases in these places endangers every member of his family and those with whom he comes in contact.

Other cities have moved in matter and have compelled proprietors of public places to properly ventilate them. It is our duty to do the Greed is an incentive which same. keeps managers from regarding the welfare of his patrons. The foul, hot breath of a large crowd is cheaper, he thinks, than coal.

Would it be asking too much for your honorable body to investigate You, and your own families are as much endangered by this evil as is the remainder of this commun-

It may, incidentally, be stated that some of our churches might have a more wide-awake congregation if they would pay more attention to the ventilation.

City Attorney's Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Gentlemen—The petition of Joseph Gauntlett for the sum of \$2,000.00 for injuries received by driving into an open tile on the south side of East Madison street, just east of the tracks of the Ann Arbor Rail Road Company, referred to me your Honorable body at your regular meeting of November 3rd, 1913, has been carefully considered by me. find that the statements in Mr. Gauntlett's petition are in the most part true. I have taken the matter up with his attorney, Mr. Andrew J. Sawyer, and we have succeeded in reaching an agreement in the matter, subject to the approval of the Common Council, Under this agreement the City is to pay to Mr. Gauntlett the sum of \$300.00 in full of his claim against the City. As Mr. Gauntlett was quite seriously hurt and was confined to his home for a period of two months, I feel that the amount stated in settlement of the case is a reasonable one. I therefore recommend that Mr. Gauntlett be paid the sum of \$300.00, and that he execute a release in full to the City of Ann Arbor from all liability in the matter upon receipt of the same.

I further recommend that the street commissioner be instructed to put the street, where Mr. Gauntlett was injured, in a safe condition.

Whereas, at a special election held in the city of Ann Arbor, State of Michigan, on the 13th day of October, 1913, the qualified electors of said city did vote to authorize the raising of the sum of twenty sand dollars by loan, such sum when raised to be used for the purpose purchasing one hundred thirty acres of land south of city and owned by J. B. Steere and Charles E. Lewis and A. F. Freeman, upon which lands the city now holds options, and which lands is commonly known as the Steere property, the same being within the prescribed radius of three miles from the limits of the city of Ann Arbor, the same to be used in connection with recently acquired water works plant for the purpose of supplying the city of Ann Arbor and the inhabitants thereof with water.

Resolved, that the Mayor and City Clerk be and are hereby directed to sign and issue Steere Farm bonds, in the sum of twenty thousand (\$20,-000.00) dollars, dated February 2nd, 1914, and deposit them with the City Treasurer, taking his receipt therefore, said bonds to be of the denomination of two hundred and (\$250.00) dollars each and payable two thousand (\$2.000.00) dollars annually, commencing August 1915, and to draw interest at rate of four per cent perprincipal and interest payable August 1st of each year at the office of the City Treasurer of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan.
