April 8, 1915. Regular session.

Meeting called to order by the president. Present: Ald. Fiegel, Heusel, A. Lutz, Hanselmann, Koernke, Flynn, Markey, Hubbard, Sherk, McGregor, Sink, G. Lutz, Pres. Schmid, 13. Minutes of previous meeting approved.

Resolutions on Death of Ald. Edwin W. Groves presented by Ald. Sink and McGregor.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—A few weeks ago our ranks were full and our members all responded to the roll call, but since our last meeting, the great record keeper, to whose roll call all must respond, has seen fit in his infinite wisdom to remove from our midst one of our loyal and worthy colleagues. Our good friend, Alderman Edwin W. Groves, who was ever regular in his attendance, at this, the last official meeting of this council, is not with us and the chair which he so regularly occupied is draped in mourning.

We, who have been associated with him so intimately and have known him so well need not be reminded of his many good qualities. For a half century he has dwelt among us, lived as a boy, was educated, and in his mature years has given to the citizens of the community the wisdom of a well trained mind. Ever conscientious and serious in all deliberations, he possessed decided opinions, but with all, was broad-minded and fearless, and never reluctant to look on all sides of a question and to assume another's point of view when added light or further information was brought forth. We have found him a strong supporter or an open-minded opponent, but always a leader in our deliberations; and we respected him. He is one who earnestly and fearlessly strove for that which he believed best for the interests of the community he loved so well. His valuable services as a member of this council were preceded by 12 years' service (July, 1900-August 1912) as the city's efficient engineer, and as such he designed and supervised many of the public improvements which have linked his name forever with the progress and developments

of the city. Not only were his services of value to the city in this public way, but as a private citizen he was connected with many of the city's leading industries, where his sterling qualities spelled success not alone for himself but for his associates as well.

Now, whereas, this valuable citizen has left us and the problems in which he was so greatly interested, both public and private, must be solved by others, and we must do without his good judgment and kindly advice:

Be it resolved that this council has been bereft of one of its most valuable members, that the city has suffered an irreparable loss, that the community has suffered the loss of one of its most distinguished citizens and that the individuals of the city have lost a loyal friend;

Be it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the members of his family, that a copy be published in the Times News, as part of the regular proceedings of this body as a mark of respect and appreciation, and that his memory may in this way be preserved to posterity by this council in the deliberations of which he was so greatly interested and took so prominent a part.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners: Gentlemen—I herewith submit the 26th annual report of fire department, April 1st, 1914, to March 31, 1915:

Station 1—One steam fire engine, tools, etc., drawn by two horses. Hose wagon No. 1, with 1,000 ft. 2 1-2 in. hose, 2 3-gal. chemicals fully equipped, tools, pipes, etc., two horses. Aerial truck, 65 ft. ext. ladder, 40 ft. ext., 30 ft., 24 ft., 20 ft., 16 ft., 12 ft. and roof ladder, 2 3-gal. chemicals, equipped with all necessary tools, 3 horses Chief's wagon used for chimney and grass fires, inspecting hydrants, buildings, etc. Exercise and supply wagon, with coal, rope, chains, deluge set etc. Reserve hose wagon with 1,000 f 2 1-2 in. hose, pipes, etc. Old Hook and ladder truck, and 2 6-gal. chemicals.

HORSES—We have ten, all in fair condition. During the year four were bought and four sold.
