Communications.
Mayor's Message.
May 1st. 1916.
To the Honorable, the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor. Gentlemen:
"Our official relations have now extended over one year and during that time much has taken place which has been a pleasure to us all, and we trust has also been of lasting benefit to the city of Ann Arbor.
"As we look back over the past year we are again reminded of the loss of our late mayor, Charles A. Sauer, and the services which he so ably and willingly rendered to his city even during the short period which he occupied the office of chief executive of this city cannot be over estimated.
"With the duties of acting mayor combined with the duties of President of the council, I find that my work has been greatly increased, and it will be only with your united support that 1 will be able to accomplish the things which should be accomplished during the coming year. This I feel sure that you will willingly give me since you have wisely or unwisely seen fit to leave the important duties of the office of Mayor with me until the next general election.
"I feel that our city is to be congratulated upon the progress made during the past year, and I am not unmindful that to you gentlemen is due in great part the credit for that progress. I feel that you have labored with a common purpose of advancing the best interests of the city, and I desire your cooperation in carrying on the affairs of the city for the year just starting.
"Two of the most important problems to come before us the coming year will be the question of finances and a good water supply. You will soon be called upon to make up a budget for the year, and I feel that by a careful scrutiny of the items which will enter into this budget it will be possible for us to reduce the tax rate from that of 1915 . I would ask that in the consideration of the
different estimates you eliminate every item not necessary for the welfare of the city. Economy has always been my slogan, but not to practice parsimony. We should make the tax rate as low as possible and live within our income. Whatever plans of progress we may enter upon must of necessity be undertaken with an understanding that it will be carried out within the limits of our funds.
"From information I have on the financial condition of our city I am pleased to say it is now very good, and much better than it has been. I am sure that with a good business administration and by observing the utmost ecrnomy that condition can be bettered.
"While the water question is not settled, I feel that much progress has been made in it during the past year, and I trust that the matter will be reviewed by the supreme court at the earliest possible date, so that the relative rights of the city of Ann Arbor and the adioining property owners can be definitely and equitably adjusted. I trust that the time will not be far distant when we will be able to go to the Steere farm for water or to some other supply of as unquestioned purity. I heartily approve of steps being taken by the water works department in an effort to increase the supply of spring water at station No. 2.
"I feel that the board of public health is to be congratulated on the good work they have been doing during the past year. It is a vital question with which they have to deal, and I trust that the matters under their care will receive the same careful attention for the next year.
"Our cemetery facilities should be extended and the opportunity may soon present itself to bring about the desired results in this matter. This is much needed for single graves by people of moderate circumstances who should be furnished respectable hurying places at a nominal cost.
"Our streets and pavements need your careful consideration. I desire to call your attention to the condition of many of our paved streets. Possibly the old adage a stitch in time will save nine might be a solution. The matter of further pavement should receive your careful consideration.
"Sidewalks which are found in bad condition should be at once repaired or replaced and made safe and passable.
"Although the citizens have voted to raise the sum of $\$ 25,000$ for the construction of a new bridge on Broadway, I feel that the bridge can and should be constructed for less money. If anything can be done to reduce the cost of this bridge $I$ am satisfied that it will be welcomed by all.
"I trust that the dust nuisance will receive the early attention of the committee having the same in charge and that a solution will be found for this ever troublesome problem.

Much money is spent each year in the extending of our sewer system. This of course is a very essential matter. The problems now before your sewer committee and your honorable body are many, and with our main sewer now taxed beyond its capacity some solution must be found at the earliest possible time.
"We are now draining the storm water of the entire southern part of the city into Allen's creek and with most of our other storm water sewers using that as an outlet we are very much overtaxing the creek proper, and I therefore heartily approve of the action taken by you under date of March 20th last, and trust that the matter will be reported in at an early date.
"The street lighting is now well taken care of and the matter of placing additional lights should receive your careful consideration.
"The fire department, now equipped with two pieces of motor driven apparatus, should be more efficient than in the past, and although there are many additional appliances needed we must do without them for the present.
"Our police force although small is quite efficient, and I feel that it is all that the city requires. I feel that we do not need a metropolitan police force for our orderly city.
"The city is now possessed of a fine system of parks and park property, and the improvement of the same should be encouraged as much as our limited means will permit. The park board is to be congratulated on its accomplishments.
"I feel that the council should pass a building code at its earliest possible convenience.
"I would also recommend that great care be exercised in the accepting of plats and additions the streets of which do not conform to those already accepted.
"Inasmuch as the citizens have declared in favor of a general charter revision and have elected a commission to carry out their wishes, I would ask your kindly co-operation to the end that a charter may be drafted and submitted that will meet with the approval of the great majority of our citizens. I feel that those who have worked under our present charter should have information which would be of much value to those working on a new charter.
"I would be most unappreciative if I should close this message without a word of gratitude for the splendid spirit of co-operation which has beon shown me during the past year by the different officers and committees. I feel that during that time the city has suffered no calamity, no financial loss and no one connected with the administration has been other than a faithful servant. If at all times we have not rendered to the public the kind of service desired, it has not been because of the lack of zeal or honest effort on the part of any officer.
"I extend sincere thanks to your honorable body for the kindly consideration shown me and I ask for a continuation of our pleasant relations for my second year in the further interests of our city. "Respectfully yours.
