To the Council: Gentlemen—We recommend that the following sidewalks be built and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, that the grading and construction of the sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Front property known as "Willow street." west side 7th street, between Bath and Miller avenue, brick cross-

walk to be assessed on owners of the property.

East side Ferdon road from No. 1125 Ferdon road south to Granger ave.

Repair sidewalks—

314 East Huron street (raise and bring to grade).

324 East Huron street (repair at west end of walk).

East side South Fourth avenue front of property south of driveway south of No. 823 South Fourth avenue (repair and mop).

We have interviewed the two property owners and find that Mr. Nixon, one of the property owners, will deed a strip of land thirty feet wide to the city for the purpose of widening said street upon the consideration that the city pay all of his sewer tax and build the sidewalk along his property.

Mr. Zebbs, the other property owner, will sell his property for the sum of \$2,000.00, and we have an agreement with the Hoover Steel Ball company, through Mr. Hoover, to take the property not needed for a street for the sum of \$1,500.00. This would leave the city paying the sum of \$500.00 for the property needed by it.

We would recommend both of the above propositions, as being the cheapest way in which we can widen the street.

We would also recommend that the Acting Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign all agreements nec-

essary to carry out the above recommendations.

We would report that a program consisting of addresses on important city topics such as "Commission Form

of Government," "Water Filtration," "Playgrounds," "Pavements," "Fire Prevention," "Garbage Disposal," "Highways," "Fire Waste and Its Prevention," "Light and Power," "City Planning," Etc., were delivered by experts along several lines.
