From Board of Park Commissioners.

July 13, 1917.

To the Common Council—In consideration of the splendid offer made to the City of Ann Arbor by the Huron Farms Co. of building a well-equipped bath-house and bathing beach for public use at the entrance to Long Shore Drive, the Board of Park Commissioners gladly submits herewith a lease to the same which it recommends for your acceptance.

The expense of maintaining this bathing beach was one of the items included in our annual budget last spring and which was accepted by the council at that time.

The beach is being equipped as an additional playground for the city and the School Board has placed two directors there to supervise the play. It is planned to have the beach open free to the public each day from 8 o'clock in the morning to 9 o'clock in the evening.

Agreement of Property Owners.

Whereas, we, the undersigned owners of the property of Eighth street, in the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan, between Huron and Washington streets, are desirous of having a sanitary sewer constructed on and along said Eighth st., and

Whereas, a sanitary sewer so constructed would be a benefit to our property.

Now therefore in consideration of the construction of the aforesaid sanitary sewer by the city of Ann Arbor we, the undersigned, hereby agree to pay any and all assessments levied on or against all of the property owned by us and fronting upon said Eighth street between Washington and Huron streets, and we hereby waive any irregularities in any proceedings taken for the construction of the aforesaid sewer and waive any defense that we might have or otherwise make to said assessments.

Park and Sanitary Committee.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Park and Sanitary committee, to whom was referred the proposed lease between the Huron Farms company, and the city of Ann Arbor relative to the bath house and bathing beach connected therewith, and the communication from the Board of Park Commissioners recommending the acceptance of said lease, has had the same under consideration, and recommends that the city lease said bath house and bathing beach connected therewith, and the Mayor and City Clerk authorized to enter into agreement hereto attached, subject to approval of City Attorney.

IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED, by and between THE HURON FARMS COMPANY, of the city of Ann Arbor, Washtenaw county and state of Michigan, and THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR, a municipal corporation, party of the second part, as follows:

The said party of the first part, in consideration of the rents, covenants and agreements herein specified does hereby LET and LEASE to the said party of the second part:

"The bathhouse and bathing beach connected therewith" located on a portion of the north half of the southeast fractional quarter of section twenty (20), town two (2) south, range six (6) east, which said bathing house and beach fronts on the Argo dam.

It is hereby agreed that said premises shall be rented by said first party to said second party for the term of five (5) years from and after this date on the terms and conditions hereinafter mentioned, to be occupied by the said second party for bathing house and bathing beach.

In consideration of said terms of rental aforesaid, the said party of the second part is to save, keep harmless and indemnify the said party of the first part of and from all harm, trouble, damage action and causes of action, cost and expense from and by reason of any negligence or misdemeanor upon the said premises of any of the employes of the said second party.

It is hereby further agreed between the parties that the annual rental to be paid by the second party for said premises is the sum of One Dollar.

It is hereby further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the said city of Ann Arbor shall grant no concessions for the sale of soft drinks, or serve soft drinks themselves or through their agents or employes, or conduct stands of any kind upon or about said premises.

It is further hereby mutually agreed that said city of Ann Arbor is to keep a man in charge of said bath house during the bathing season, and to pay all expense in connection therewith and do everything that is necessary to keep said building in a habitable and good condition.

It is further agreed that if there is any default in the management or conduct of said bathing house, that it shall be lawful for said party of the first part, its attorneys, successors, representatives or assigns, to re-enter and to re-possess the said premises, and the said party of the second part, and each and every other occupant to remove and put out.

It is further agreed between the parties that the said city of Ann Arbor shall not assign or transfer this lease

or sub-let said premises, or any part thereof, without the written assent of the said party of the first part.

It is further hereby mutually agreed that no liquors shall be sold upon said premises, and that said business shall be at all times conducted in an orderly and respectable manner.

It is further hereby agreed that the said city of Ann Arbor upon the termination of this lease shall deliver up said premises to the said party of the first part in like condition as when taken, reasonable use and wear thereof and damage by the elements excepted.

Special Committee on Garbage Disposal.

Ald. Freeman presented tentative contract with Mr. Henry H. Wagoner. On motion of Ald. Freeman, the amount of surety bond was placed at \$6,000.00.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen Your special committee on garbage disposal, to whom was referred the matter of contract with Mr. H. H. Wagoner, has had the same under consideration, and respectfully recommends that the accompanying contract, tendered by Mr. Wagoner, be accepted, when approved by the City Attorney, and that upon such approval the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign contract. Contract.

Tentative Contract.

Memorandum of Agreement, by and between the Corporate City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, hereinafter called the city, and Henry H. Wagoner, of Huntington, Indiana, hereinafter designated Wagoner, entered

into this day of July, A. D. 1917, wittnesseth:

That each party herein binds himself, his heirs and assigns, to observe, do and perform the following things, terms, conditions and covenants:

The said Wagoner agrees to collect and reduce to a complete ash, without odor or objectionable feature, all the garbage in said city for a term of five years from the day of 1917, under the terms and conditions hereinafter set out, for the sum of six thousand dollars per year, payable monthly on the Tuesday after the first Monday of each month by the city.

And the city agrees to permit said Wagoner to so have the exclusive collection and disposal thereof for said term; provided, however, that upon written request of any citizen, said citizen may dispose of such garbage by other means, without cost or liability to Wagoner, and the same may be cared for by some one other than Wagoner. Written permission to be granted by Wagoner.

Said Wagoner agrees to erect and operate a sanitary garbage incinerator of sufficient capacity and with such plans and designs, that an additional capacity of more units may be added thereto, on land hereinafter described in the City of Ann Arbor, to-wit:

which land is hereby leased to said Wagoner, for the purpose of incinerator construction and use, for the term of said above mentioned five years, or during the life of this contract or any renewal thereof.

Said incinerator foundations and said two burners, exclusive of the foundation for any tall or permanent chimney, shall be so built by said Wagoner that the same will sustain a permanent building and shall be so planned and arranged that additional units with additional foundations may be added thereto and a permanent stack made therefore if desired by the city, and the city shall have full right at any time to enter said premises and so construct any improvements; provided, however, the city shall not interfere with the working of said Wagoner in the discharge of this contract.

At any time after the expiration of the first year of this contract the city may, by giving 60 days' notice, take over said plant at its cost price, less a depreciation of 20 percent for each

year, or proportionate part thereof, and may terminate this contract. At the expiration of said five years, the city may, without cost or expense, take over as its sole property, at its option, all of said plant excepting the personal property, consisting of teams, wagons, etc., which shall remain the property of said Wagoner.

When said city shall take over said plant, then said Wagoner shall cause to be conveyed by proper deeds, the right to use the patents under which such plant is constructed, and improvements thereon, without expense to the city.

Said incinerator plant is to be completed within 90 days after the execution of this contract, unless prevented by causes beyond the control of said Wagoner, and he shall then commence the collection and burning of garbage. Said plant shall be finished with dash pebble construction on the outside, or other equal finish, satisfactory to the city.

The city agrees to enact and enforce an ordinance requiring the garbage which is to be collected to be dry and devoid of free water and to be kept in covered metal receptacles until collected, and the presence of free water shall justify the refusal to so collect such garbage so carrying free water. Said Wagoner shall insure his employes and shall save the city harmless of all liens, costs and charges excepting as above set out.

Said collection and incinerator plant shall be operated under the approval of the City Health Officer and Wagoner shall comply with the requests of said officer when made for the purposes of keeping the same thoroughly sanitary. The plant shall contain a hot water system for the purpose of washing the wagons.

Said collection of garbage shall be made in covered wagons and shall be conducted as regards frequency, as directed by the city, but Wagoner shall not be obliged to collect more frequently than once each day in the business part of the city and at hospitals and boarding houses and three times per week in the residence portion of the city during the months of April, May, June, July, August and September, and twice a week at other times. The city may reduce the collections required, but the maximum amount shall be as above.

Wagoner shall execute his surety company bond, of \$6,000.00 to the city, to the approval of the city at-

torney, for the faithful performance of this contract.

Resolved, that the Mayor and City Clerk be and are hereby directed to sign and issue fire department bonds in the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00), dated August 1st, 1917, and deposit them with the City Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor. Said bonds to be of the denomination of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) each, and payable two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) annually, commencing August 1st, 1918, and to draw interest at the rate of four and one-half percent (4½ percent) per annum, principal and interest payable on August 1st, of each year at the office of the City Treasurer of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Moved by Ald. Markey, that the Health Officer be included with City

Officials, who are authorized to attend the convention of the League of Michigan Municipalities at Grand Rapids.

Moved by Ald. Donnelly, that City Attorney Frank B. DeVine act as chairman of the delegation. Adopted.
