Sidewalk Committee.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen — Your Sidewalk committee respectfully recommends that the following sidewalks be ordered built, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, that the grading and construction of the sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered that stone or cement sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the City of Ann Arbor, on and along the east side of North Main street, from the end of the present sidewalk north to the city limits.

Michigan Milling Co., lots 1, 2 and 3, B 11, Ormsby's and Page's Add. Also a parcel of land bounded on the W. by N. Main st., N by M. C. R. Reports of City Treasurer, Clerk, Engineer, Street Commissioner and Acting Marshal for month of February, received and ordered to take usual course.

Ann Arbor, Mich., March 18, 1918.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—You will see in the City Engineer's annual report, under the head Sanitary Sewers, District No. 85, that Killins' Subdivision Company agreed to pay the first quarter of the cost of Sewer No. 84, in order to reduce the bond issue on district 84, so that the bond issue for sewer district 85 would come within the limit provided by the charter for outstanding sewer bonds. On August 7th, 1917, Mr. Killins paid in \$2,103.00, one-fourth of the Engineer's estimate at that time. The final estimate of the cost of this sewer was \$7,218.53, of which the property to pay \$6,592.86, and the city \$625.67. This would make Killins' portion for the quarter as agreed \$1,648.22, therefore he has paid \$454.78 over amount due on agreement. In issuing bonds for said sewer, the Engineer's estimate, \$8,412.00, was used, and bonds due in 1921, the last quarter, to the amount of \$2,103.00, was cancelled. I recommend that the treasurer be authorized to accept from Mr. Killins \$1,209.91 (which amount with the \$2,103.00 already paid in, covers two quarters), and issue receipts for same covering first and fourth quarters sewer tax on sewer district number 84. As the \$2,103.00 cash, \$6,309.00 bond sale, and \$45.30 allowance on sewer pipe, making a total of \$8,457.30, was charged to Labor Account Sewer District No. 84, and sewer is now paid for, less 5 per cent, \$350.86, due contractor Nov. 5th, 1918. I further recommend that the sum of \$1,319.26 be transferred from Labor Account Sewer District No. 84, to Tax Account Sewer District No. 84, where it prop-

erly belongs to take up bonds when due.
