#### Engineer's Estimates and Report.

City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, March  
7, 1918.

To the Board of Public Works, Ann  
Arbor, Michigan: Sirs—I am present-  
ing you herewith three statements of  
amounts still due Wm. Eddy & Son,  
and one of the amount due the city for  
work improperly done by them. The  
estimate for \$76.00 in favor of Wm.  
Eddy & Son on South State st. and  
Dewey ave., and the estimate for  
\$174.20 on Cambridge rd. and Baldwin  
ave storm sewer, are items that were  
by mistake omitted from their final  
estimate on these districts. The work  
was actually done by them, and out  
of fairness to them they deserve pay  
for it. We have measured the work  
very carefully and are satisfied that  
these amounts are still due them. The  
one for \$160.10, on Sanitary sewer dis-  
trict No. 75, was a clerical error on  
the final estimate in making deduc-  
tions for the amount paid on prev-  
ious estimates. While we regret  
these errors, especially inasmuch as  
they are the only three of the kind  
that have occurred since I have been  
City Engineer, and come all at once  
and right at the end of my tenure of  
office, they are nevertheless payments  
which are due Messrs. Wm. Eddy &  
Son for work done by them, and  
should in all fairness to them be pre-  
sented to you and by you to the Council  
for payment.

The matter of sanitary sewer man-  
hole at the corner of Seventh and Wil-  
low sts. is explained in my letter rela-  
tive to it. The \$91.00 for rebuilding  
this manhole should be collected from  
Wm. Eddy & Son, before they are

paid the amounts due them on the three estimates previously referred to. Respectfully submitted: Manley Os-good, City Engineer.

City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, February 19, 1918.

To the Board of Public Works, Ann Arbor, Michigan: Sirs—On Seventh st. at the corner of Willow st., during the past year, it became necessary to tear down and entirely reconstruct a manhole which was built by Messrs. Wm. Eddy & Son, under their contract for Sanitary sewer district No. 68. Had this manhole been built in accordance with our specifications, rebuilding would not have been necessary. The total cost of rebuilding was \$91.00. I recommend deduction of that amount from moneys which are now due Messrs. Wm. Eddy & Son.

#### Special Committee on Resolutions.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—“Since the entrance of our country into the present world war, and the creation of the new national army many of the young men of our city and environs have left for the various military camps and naval training stations, and at the present time a goodly number of our representatives are fighting valiantly in France, and on the seas.

“We are proud of these young men. We trust and pray that success will crown their efforts and that when the

glorious peace to which we are all looking forward at last comes, many of them will return to us safely, their work well done. We honor and respect these patriots who have gone from our midst. They are making every sacrifice that right may prevail, and that we who are left behind and our allies may pursue our legitimate and rightful aims in life freely and without molestation. We realize, however, that some will never return and that others will return broken in mind and body. We honor them all.

“Two of our young men have already made the supreme sacrifice by giving up their lives: William Herman Wanzeck, and John Monahan, both of whom were stationed at Camp Custer. They were splendid types of manhood; each a loyal son of America. They were born in our city. Here they passed their boyhood, and attained young manhood, and each was loved by a wide circle of acquaintances.

“William Wanzeck passed away a few month ago as a result of illness contracted at camp, while but a few days ago we were grieved to learn of the death of John Monahan, as the result of an accident, while engaged in military duties.

“Although they were stricken in the course of their training, before they had had opportunity to meet the enemy on the field of battle, we honor them equally, for they were ready and prepared to do all that lies within the power of mortal man, for their country.

“It is therefore fitting that this council recognize their valuable services and in token thereof

“It is resolved that a copy of this memorial be placed in the proceedings of this body, that a copy be sent to the families of the two young men, and that it be printed in the Times News of Ann Arbor.
