Mayer moved to reconsider action taken by Council at last regular meeting, relative to resolution regarding issue of \$120,000 of waterworks bonds, which motion was adopted by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Mayer, Ehnis, Henderson, Donnelly, Ryan, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert, Pres. Lewis, 13. Nays, none.

Ald. Mayer asked permission to withdraw resolution relative to issue of \$120,000 of Waterworks bonds, which was granted by unanimous vote of those present, 13.

By Ald. Mayer: Whereas, the electors of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, by a vote of more than three-fifths of the votes cast at a special election held on the seventh day of April, 1919, did authorize the raising by loan of the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00) and issuing the bonds of the city of Ann Arbor therefor, payable not more than ten years from date of issue, and bearing interest not exceeding six per cent per annum, of which sum forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000.00) to be used for the purpose of completing a certain pumping station and pipe lines now under construction in connection with the Water Works System

of said city, and the balance of said sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00), being seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000.00) is to be used for the purpose of purchasing and installing water meters in connection with said Water Works System of said city.

Now, therefor, it is hereby resolved that the bonds of the city of Ann Arbor be issued in the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00), for the purposes aforesaid: That said bonds be one hundred and twenty in number of the denomination of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each, numbered consecutively from one to one hundred twenty: Be dated August 1st, 1919, and become due and payable on August 1st, 1929, with interest thereon at five per cent, per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of August and the first day of February each year, as evidenced by interest coupons to be thereto attached, bearing the printed or lithographed signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk of the city of Ann Arbor, both principal and interest to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer, City Hall, Ann Arbor, Mich.

Resolved, further, that said bonds be in such form as shall be furnished by the purchaser of said bonds.

Resolved, further that the matter of the sale of said bonds be referred to the Finance committee of the Common Council, with power to act.

Adopted by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Mayer, Ehnis, Henderson, Donnelly, Ryan, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert, Pres. Lewis, 13. Nays, none.

By Ald. Lutz: Resolved, that the Finance committee be and are hereby authorized to purchase such additional filing equipment for the vault in the office of City Clerk as they deem necessary.
