Resolutions.

By Ald Haarer:

Whereas, the City of Ann Arbor, under date of June 28th, A. D. 1910, through a decree of the Circuit Court for the County of Washtenaw, in Chancery, obtained title to the following described property, situated and being in the

City of Ann Arbor, County of Washtenaw and State of Michigan, and described as follows, to-wit:

All that part of J. B. Baldwin's Third Addition to the City of Ann Arbor lying south of Wells Street and bounded as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the south line of Wells Street with the west line of said Addition; thence east on the south line of Wells Street extended east eighteen chains and eight links; thence south on a line parallel with the west line of said addition; thence west on the south line of said addition to the west line thereof; thence north on the west line of said addition to the place of beginning containing nineteen and five one hundredths acres of land, more or less, reserving the right of way two rods wide from the intersection of Baldwin Avenue with the north line of the land herein conveyed, thence along the north line of said land to the east line thereof, and

Whereas, said decree further provided as follows:

"It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed that the said City of Ann Arbor in consideration of the premises, shall forever keep and maintain said described premises as a public park and shall forever keep and maintain the one half mile race track now on said premises, and for that purpose said City shall expend annually not less than the sum of One Hundred Dollars in keeping and maintaining said race track and shall give to the Ann Arbor Driving Club or any other association composed of the citizens of the City of Ann Arbor the free use of said track at any time for the purpose of having driving contests and speed trials and said City shall build and forever maintain twenty stalls to be used in connection with said race track," and

Whereas, in the opinion of the Common Council the said race track should no longer be maintained upon said property so described as aforesaid, and

Whereas, in the opinion of the Common Council the title of the said City of Ann Arbor can be cleared of the encumbrance of said race track through proper court proceedings for the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars, and

Whereas, the said City has not
