#### **Ordinance Committee**

Ald. Haarer presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to naming streets. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain" which was given its first reading by title passed to and given its second reading and referred to Ordinance committee by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Slauson, Sugden, Ehnis, Haarer, Lucas, Henderson, Donnelly, Groves, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, White, Norris, Lutz, Pres. Reichert, 15. Nays, none.

Ald. Haarer presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

**An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance Entitled, "An Ordinance to Regulate and Control the Selling of Milk Within the City of Ann Arbor and to License Vendors Thereof and to Regulate the Care of Cows From Which the Milk is Sold, and for the Inspection and Examination of Dairies and Dairy Herds and of Milk."**

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That section three of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to Regulate and Control the Selling of Milk Within the City of Ann

Arbor and to License Vendors Thereof, and to Regulate the Care of Cows from Which Milk is Sold, and for the Inspection and Examination of Dairies and Dairy Herds and of Milk," passed March 14, 1904, approved March 22, 1904, amended April 18, 1904; amended January 4, 1915; amended November 19, 1917, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. The City Clerk shall not issue any such license unless the applicant therefor presents a statement in writing which shall state full and explicitly.

First—The name and residence of said applicant.

Second—The name and residence of the driver or person delivering the milk to his customers.

Third—The exact location or place from which said applicant obtains his milk, including the names and locations of all persons from whom he obtains milk.

Fourth—The number of cows in his herd, if a producer in whole or in part and the number of cows in any other herd from which he obtains milk.

Fifth—The manner in which the applicant intends to dispose of his milk when licensed. Said applicant shall also present a written consent from each person from whom he obtains milk, granting permission to the health officer of said city, his representatives or any member of the Board of Health of the City of Ann Arbor, free and open access to his or her dairy or premises for the purpose of making an inspection of the premises or herd, and upon consent of the owner of said herd applying the "Tuberculin test" as hereinafter provided.

Provided, That in case of any sudden or unexpected demand for milk, which may reasonably be expected to exceed the ordinary supply, then, and in that case, any person holding a license as provided for in this ordinance may, and he is hereby authorized to purchase the needed extra supply of any person or persons who will, before said milk is sold to said dealer, sign the written consent hereinbefore in this section provided for. And Provided further, That said dealer or dealers, so purchasing said milk as aforesaid, shall, before distributing or deliv-

ering said milk or any portion thereof, present a sample of said milk so purchased as aforesaid, to the health officer aforesaid, for inspection and obtain from said health officer a certificate that said milk contains no substances deleterious or dangerous to health.

The City Clerk shall not issue any such license unless the Health Officer is satisfied with the sanitary conditions of the stables and premises where the cows are kept by the applicant and his approval affixed to the application of said applicant. The City Clerk may, at any time, revoke the license of any vendor of milk, cream, skimmed milk or buttermilk if upon investigation and report of the Health Officer he shall find the herd, stables where the cows are kept or the condition of the licensee's wagon, vehicle, containant or person, cows or milk offered for sale to be deleterious or dangerous to the public health.

Sixth—No milk shall be sold within the City of Ann Arbor unless said milk is pasteurized or is what is known as Grade A raw milk.

"Grade A Milk" shall be produced under sanitary conditions similar to those required for the production of Certified milk except that the bacteria count shall not exceed fifty thousand per cubic centimeter. Said milk shall have a fat content of not less than four per centum and shall be drawn from tuberculosis-tested cows only.

"Pasteurized Milk" shall mean a clean milk that has been brought to a temperature of 145 degrees Fahrenheit, held at this temperature for thirty minutes then rapidly cooled to 60 degrees Fahrenheit, then capped and bottled by up to date automatic devices. No milk shall be pasteurized more than once. The bacterial count before pasteurizing shall not be over one million and after pasteurizing not over fifty thousand per cubic centimeter. All such milk shall be put in sterilized containers and bottled at the plant. Pasteurized milk offered for sale must be labeled "Pasteurized." It shall also be the duty of the Milk Inspector to inspect all pasteurizing plants, creameries, ice cream factories, milk depots and all places where milk or ice cream, or

both, are kept for sale within the City of Ann Arbor as often as may be required by the Board of Health, but at least once a year. Vehicles used to convey milk to market must under no conditions be used for the haulage of garbage or any refuse. All vehicles for the distribution of milk at retail shall be labeled "Pasteurized Milk" or "Grade A. Milk."

Seventh—Each or both pasteurizing machine in each pasteurizing plant shall be equipped with an automatic recording device and the recording cards of such device shall be filed daily with the Board of Health of the City of Ann Arbor.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance is to take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"
