Ordinance Committee.

Ald. MacGregor presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance Entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Public Gasoline or Oil Filling Stations or Sales Deposits."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation for themselves or as agents, renters or lessees, to locate, build, erect, construct, maintain or operate any public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot on or within 190 feet from the curb line of any street in the city or to construct or maintain a driveway from the street over the curb and sidewalk to such public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot, when three-fourths of the buildings on both sides of the street for a distance of 500 feet in either direction from the proposed location of each wall of such public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot are used exclusively for residence or educational purposes or both without first securing from the city council a permit therefore; nor shall any such permit be granted unless the applicant for such permit shall have first secured the written consent of two-thirds of the owners of property abutting on the street for a distance of 500 feet in each direction from the median line of such proposed public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot, according to the frontage on both sides of the street and which said written consent shall be attached to the application for such permit.

Section 2. To locate, build, erect, construct, maintain or operate any public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot in violation of any provision of this ordinance is hereby declared to be a nuisance per se.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation, or any agent, renter or lessee, of any such person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100 for each offense, and each day of continued violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense after the first prosecution has begun.

Section 4. It shall be the duty

of the Mayor or in his absence the President of the Council to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk make all necessary arrangements for registration to precede said election and that registration shall be at the office of the City Clerk during regular office hours and that on Saturday, March 11, 1922, and Saturday, March 18, 1922, the office of the City Clerk shall be open from 8 o'clock a. m. until 8 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of registration, and that the City Clerk be authorized to appoint such assistants as may be necessary for registration and to properly comply with absent voters' law, such assistants to receive four dollars per day.
