Ald. Groves made oral report as follows:

Complying with resolution of Council of June 5, 1922, Finance

Committee received sealed proposals for publishing the proceedings of the Common Council and Board of Public Works and City notices for the period of one year ensuing July 9, 1922, as follows:

The Ann Arbor Times News — seven point type, price per inch of two-inch newspaper column, set solid, 50c per inch; proceedings in pamphlet form, price per page 50c.

The Washtenaw Post — eight point type, price per inch of two-inch newspaper column, set solid 42c per inch; price per inch of 11 1-2 ems, set solid, 40c per inch; proceedings in pamphlet form, price per page two-inch columns 45c; price per page 11 1-2 ems columns 45c.

Matter was referred back to Finance Committee.

#### Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Haarer presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

#### Ann Arbor Market Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH, LOCATE, REGULATE AND MAINTAIN A PUBLIC MARKET IN THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR:

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. The location of the public market for said city shall be determined by the Common Council.

Section 2. All articles intended and held for sale on said market may be offered for sale on Wednesdays and Saturdays of each week. The opening hour for the market shall be 6 a. m. from April 1st to October 31st, and 7 a. m. from November 1st to March 31st. On Wednesdays the closing hour shall be 12 m. (noon) and on Saturdays 1 p. m.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the market master to superintend said market and keep it thoroughly clean and in good order, and to report to the Board of Public Works of said City such improvements or alterations in or about such market as may be deemed necessary. The market master shall, during the hours fixed for such public market, be in constant attendance and preserve good order during said hours. The market master shall see that no

imposition is practiced by buyers or sellers; the market master shall cause the market vehicles to be so placed in the market space as best to subserve the public generally and shall prevent or remove all obstructions or nuisances ready to exist or actually existing in such market; and shall direct, arrange and adjust the situations for sale of all articles. The market master shall see that all of the provisions of this or any other ordinance passed in regard to said market be faithfully complied with and all violations of the same shall be prosecuted.

Section 4. The said streets so set aside for market purposes may be occupied by persons who offer for sale articles of their own raising or production and none other, provided, however, that any raiser or producer may offer for sale and sell articles of his own production or raising by or through any member of his family or regular employee, but, before such person may offer any such article for sale, he shall first convince said market master that he is such bona fide family member or employee of the said raiser or producer; further, that tropical fruits may be sold by any person on said market on any regular market day during the year provided said person holds a Huckster License from the city, and complies with this ordinance.

Section 5. All articles sold by weight shall be sold on said market according to the established standard of the State of Michigan.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any article according to weight on said market except by weighing the same with scales or weights in accordance with those authorized by this Council in charge of the market master.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale on said market any butter in lumps or rolls unless each of such lumps or rolls be of some specified weight and shall be so marked.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, offer or expose for sale any unwholesome or spoiled product or provision of any kind in said market.

Section 9. It shall be unlawful for any occupant of any situation for sale in the said city market to attract attention to his articles,

goods, wares, or merchandise, by outcry in a loud and annoying manner.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful for any person occupying a situation for sale on the market to allow his horse or horses to remain hitched to any vehicle on or along the said market place between the hours of opening or closing of said market.

Section 11. It shall be unlawful for any person occupying a situation for sale on said market to permit any refuse garbage, or trash of any kind whatsoever to remain on or near his situation for sale at the time of the closing of the market.

Section 12. A Market Committee composed of three persons serving without pay, shall be chosen, two shall be appointed by the Mayor and one representative shall be chosen by the Gardener's Association for the term of one year. It shall be the duty of said committee to appoint the market master and to assist, in an advisory way, in the performance of his duty.

Section 13. A yearly fee shall be charged for situation on said market, the amount thereof to be determined by the market committee, and based upon the location but such fee shall not exceed twenty dollars (\$20.00) for a single situation. A daily transient fee of twenty-five cents (25c) shall be charged. All holders of year situations shall forfeit their place for the day if not in their place at 7 a. m. The market master shall collect all rentals and fees derived from sale of situations or otherwise and after the committee has paid necessary expenses this committee shall turn all surplus over to the City Treasurer to be held for the purchase of a Public Market to be owned solely by the City, and under its full control and direction.

Section 14. No person shall sublet or transfer his space or stall so rented, to any other party, except as hereinbefore provided.

Section 15. The situations shall be allotted previous to March 1st, by the Market Committee, to persons occupying them the previous year, and later, to applicants in order received.

Section 16. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined, upon conviction,

in any sum not less than one dollar (\$1.00) and not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

Section 17. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten days after legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Johnson, Haarer, Gra., Henderson, Lucas, Groves, Markey, Moore, Spathelf, White, Freeman, Pres. Sugden, 12. Nays, none.

#### Sewer Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council,  
Gentlemen:

Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimate and report of the City Engineer, relative to the construction of lateral sewer in lateral sewer district No. 112, from Third Ward School to Seventh st., begs leave to report that we have had such estimate and report as well as resolution of Council under consideration and have made due inquiries relating thereto and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewer in said district, and that special taxing or assessment district ought to be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the construction of such sewer may be charged, street intersections excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

Your Committee further recommends that resolution fixing the boundaries of said district be prepared by the City Engineer and the Board of Public Works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of said sewer.

Your Committee further recommends that a sanitary sewer be constructed on John st. from Fifth ave. to Division st. and that the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of cost for said sewer; and that the construction of said sewer is hereby deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Your Committee further recommends that Melinda Luick be permitted to connect her property on Dorset road with sanitary sewer on Berkshire road without ex-

pense to city and under the direction of the City Engineer.

#### Street Committee.

By Ald. Henderson:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the east line of Oakland Avenue, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the west line of Oakland Avenue, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the west line of Oakland Avenue, thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the east line of Oakland Avenue, thence southerly to the point of beginning.

That portion of Haven Avenue included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of the

intersection of the north line of Monroe street and the east line of Haven Avenue, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the west line of Haven Avenue, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the west line of Haven Avenue, thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the east line of Haven Avenue, thence southerly to the point of beginning.

That portion of College Avenue included between the east line of East University Avenue and the west line of Church Street.

That portion of East University Avenue included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University Avenue and the east line of East University, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University Avenue and the west line of East University, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of North University Avenue and the west line of East University Avenue, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw avenue and the east line of east University avenue thence southerly to the point of beginning.

That portion of Church Street included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of Church Street thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west line of Church Street, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the west line of Church Street, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the east line of Church Street, thence southerly to the point of beginning.

AND WHEREAS, the said Council gave notice of the pendency of

the question of ordering such proposed improvement to the owners, occupants or persons interested, or his, her or their agent or representative by personal service and by posting of notices at least ten days before the time of hearing, and

WHEREAS, the Council fixed the time and place of said meeting as of the 26th day of May, A. D. 1922, at two o'clock P. M., Eastern Standard Time at the Council Chamber at the City Hall in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and

WHEREAS, the said Council met at the time and place herein stated and heard the persons interested therein and

WHEREAS the hearing was adjourned to the 9th day of June, 1922, for the purpose of further consideration of the proposed closing of said streets and a meeting was held on that date pursuant to the said adjournment at 7:30 P. M., in the Council Chamber of the City Hall and, after hearing the persons interested, the Council decided to take final action with regard to the question of closing of said streets at the regular meeting of the Council to be held on June 19, 1922, and therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the council, after giving the matter due deliberation and consideration, hereby determines to vacate and discontinue the said parts and portions of said streets hereinbefore named and described, pursuant to the Charter and Ordinances of the said city.

**Agreement Between the Regents of the University of Michigan and the City of Ann Arbor.**

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT, made this 19th day of June, A. D. 1922 by and between THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN party of the first part, and THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR, a municipal corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Michigan, party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, more than ten freeholders of the City of Ann Arbor

have petitioned the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor to discontinue and vacate certain portions or parts of the following streets:

That portion of Oakland Avenue included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the east line of Oakland Avenue, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the west line of Oakland Avenue thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the west line of Oakland Avenue, thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the east line of Oakland Avenue, thence southerly to the point of beginning

That portion of Haven Avenue included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of the intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the east line of Haven Avenue, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe Street and the west line of Haven Avenue, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the west line of Haven Avenue thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University Avenue and the east line of Haven Avenue, thence southerly to the point of beginning.

That portion of College Avenue included between the east line of East University Avenue and the west line of Church Street.

That portion of East University Avenue included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University Avenue and the east line of East University thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University Avenue and the west line of East University, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of North University Avenue and the west

line of East University Avenue, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the east line of East University Avenue, thence southerly to the point of beginning.

That portion of Church Street included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of Church Street, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west line of Church Street, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the west line of Church Street, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the east line of Church Street, thence southerly to the point of beginning.

AND WHEREAS, the city of Ann Arbor, through its Common Council has determined by proper resolution that the proposed improvement is advisable, after giving notice to all persons interested as required by law, and

WHEREAS, the streets above mentioned and described are to be used by the Regents of the University of Michigan in order that the said Regents may proceed with its building program according to present plans, and

WHEREAS the streets will not be closed until the property on both sides thereof is owned by the University.

NOW THEREFORE, it is hereby MUTUALLY AGREED by and between the parties hereto as follows.

1—In consideration of the vacating and closing of said streets, the party of the first part hereby agrees to assume any suits for damages on account of closing of said streets above described, if any such suits should arise, and shall have the right, through its own attorneys, to defend such suits if any should arise, and hereby agrees to indemnify the City for any damages that may be incurred by it by the closing and vacating of said streets, or any proceeding incident thereto.

2—The party of the first part will re-imburse the city of Ann Arbor,

party of the second part, for whatever the city has paid for the paving of the sections of the streets closed of East University Avenue and Church Street.

3—The said party of the first part will not remove, unless necessary the water or gas mains or pipes or the sewers or conduits or cables now located in said streets, but said city, or the employes of any of the public utilities, shall at all times have access to the same. If it becomes necessary to move either water or gas pipes, sewers or telephone conduits and cables it shall be done at the expense of first party, and be relaid by said first party at its own expense to complete circuit.

4—The party of the first part will furnish the land or pay the necessary cost of the land required to connect Forest Avenue to Fourteenth Street when building is constructed across Church Street, and do the necessary grading in accordance with plans of Board of Public Works to place the street in condition for public use and travel, without cost to the party of the second part.

5—The first party will round the northeast corner of the junction of Twelfth Street and North University Avenue at its own expense, in accordance with the plan of the City Engineer.

6—The said party of the second part may gravel and use for parking space a portion of the old street now a part of the campus at the corner of State Street and South University Avenue.

7—That the party of the first part will not injure the property of any person and will assume all liability so far as the city is concerned with the closing of said streets, and save said city harmless.

8—That the owners of all abutting property on said streets and other persons, shall have free ingress and egress as at present to the said streets until such time as the University owns or obtains releases from owners of all property abutting on portion concerned.

9—That when the property is purchased by the first party abutting on said above described streets, or when first party obtains proper releases, the city will give a re-

lease of any interest that it may have in such streets, to the party of the first part, said first party.

10—In consideration of the aforesaid, said party of the second part hereby agrees to vacate and discontinue the aforesaid streets pursuant to the terms of this agreement, at the next regular meeting of the Common Council.

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University Avenue and the east line of East University, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University Avenue and the west line of East University, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of North University Avenue and the west line of East University Avenue, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the east line of East University Avenue thence southerly to the point of beginning.

That portion of Church Street included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the east line of Church Street, thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of South University and the west line of Church Street, thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the west line of Church Street, thence southeasterly to the point of intersection of the south line of Washtenaw Avenue and the east line of Church Street, thence southerly to the point of beginning has determined to vacate and discontinue said portion or parts thereof, and

WHEREAS, the Regents of the University of Michigan have presented to the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor a certain



contract and agreement with regard to the closing of said streets executed this 19th day of June 1922, by the President and Secretary of the University of Michigan, pursuant to the resolution of the Board of Regents authorizing the execution thereof, and

WHEREAS the said contract and agreement as submitted contains certain covenants and agreements with regard to the closing of the said streets satisfactory to the Council, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the streets hereinbefore described shall be vacated and discontinued pursuant to the terms of the said agreement and in accordance with the provisions thereof and, further

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor of the city and the City Clerk be and the same are hereby authorized to execute the said agreement for and on behalf of the said city and that the said agreement when so executed shall be made a part of the records and files of the said city.

By Ald. Groves:

Moved by Ald. Lucas, that the garage committee be authorized to purchase speedometers for all city cars not equipped with same.

Adopted by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Johnson, Haarer, Graf, Henderson, Lucas, Groves, Markey, Moore, Spathelf, White, Freeman, Pres. Sugden, 12. Nays, none.

On motion of Ald. Lucas, the Park Board was instructed to have telephone and other poles not in use removed from lawn extensions on W. Huron st.

On motion of Ald. Henderson, the City Engineer, Chairman of Sewer Committee and a number of Board of Public Works, to be appointed by President of Board, were appointed a committee to meet with Township Board of Pittsfield Township, relative proposed sewer ditch.

City Attorney informed Council that water cases would be heard June 26.

On motion of Ald. Lucas, Council adjourned.
