Ordinance Committee

Ald. Haarer presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading:

An ord nance regulating public dances in the city of Ann Arbor. The Common Council of the city

of Ann Arbor ordain:

The "Public Sect on 1. term Dance" as used in this ordinance shall be held to mean any dance where any of the expenses connected with such dance are borne e ther directly or ind rectly by the people at end ng such dance; or where the invitation to attend such dance is not issued in person or by written invitation by the person or persons giving same; or any dance to which admission may be had by the payment of a fee or by the purchase, possession or presentation of a ticket or token obtained for money or any valuable thing: or in which a charge is made for caring for clothing or other propery; or any dance to which the public generally may obtain mission with or without the payment of a fee. Provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to private dances given by families their homes, or by any legally organ zed fraternal society or o'her organizat on, organized for other objects and purposes other than dancing, and where the public is not admitted.

It shall be unlawful to hold any public dance or to give instruction in dancing for hire in any hall, academy or place within the city limits of the City of Ann Arbor until the hall, academy or place in which the same may be he'd shall have first been duly licensed for such purposes as hereinaf er provided. The owner of any such hall, academy or place, shall apply to the City Clerk for a license for said hall academy or place, which application shall be on a form to be furnished by the City Clerk and no such license shall be granted until the application shall be approved by the Mayor. Upon the approval of said application by Mayor, such applicant shall

pay to the City Clerk an annual license fee of five (\$5.00) dollars. Any I cense issued under this ordnance shall expire on the first Monday of June following the issuance thereof, unless otherwise limited or revoked.

Upon the approval of said application by the city Mayor, the City Clerk shall issue a license as nereinbefore provided and the owner, lessee or person, firm or corporation in charge of said hall, academy or place, shall post said license in a conspicuous place in said hall,

academy or place.

Sect on 3. No license for a public dance hall, academy or place shall be issued unt I the C ty Mayor or someone du'y authorized by the City Mayor shall investigate said hall, academy or place and determine that such hall, academy or place complies with and conforms to the laws of the State of Michigan and the ordinances and health and fire regulations of the City of Ann Arbor and that said hall, academy or place is properly lighted and ventilated, supplied with adequate to let conveniences for each sex and is a safe, sanitary and proper place for the purpose for which it is to be used.

The license of any Sect on 4. public dance hall may be suspended by the City Mayor or revoked by the Common Council for disimmoral conduct orderly or violattion of therein or for provisions this the other or any ordiordinance nance of the C'ty of Ann Arbor. public dance hall license Any under the provisions of this ordinance may be entered at any time by the City Mayor or any member of the Police Department of the City of Ann Arbor, or any person duly authorized by the C ty Mayor for that purpose. The C ty Mayor or any member of the Police Department of the City of Ann Arbor may cause any public ance to be discontinued and may cause the place where said dance is being held to be vacated during the progress of a public dance for any reason for which a license may be suspended or revoked as provided. In case any herein license granted hereunder shall be so suspended or revoked at least six (6) months shall elapse before another License shall be issued for holding a public dance in the same place

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, f.rm or corporation, to hold any public dance in any place in the City of Ann Arbor without having first obtained a permit therefor from the City Clerk for a stated time, and no person, society or corporation, failing to enforce a' dances the requirements laid by statute or ordinance upon public dance halls, shall be granted second permit within six months from the date of such failure and any failure or neglect on the part of the manager or propretor or person in charge, of any hall used for public dances, to secure and require the proper permit for such dance, shall subject each person, firm or corporat on, to the penalty provided for a violation of this ordinance.

Upon application being filed with the C ty Clerk for the permit in this section spec fied, the City Clerk shall, when the application shall be approved by the City Mayor, issue the permit to the applicant and the applicant shall pay the City Clerk a permit fee of one (\$1.00) dollar for each permit.

Section 6. All public dance halls, academ es or places in which public dances shall be held shall be closed on or before the hour of one o'clock a. m. Except when special permission for extension of the time may be granted by the City Mayor. On Saturdays said public dance shall close at 12

o'clock midnight.

It shall be un!awful Section 7. to knowingly permit any person under sixteen years of age to attend or remain at any public dance unless each person be accompanied by the parent or guardian of such person or by a responsible escort parent or guardian. approved by It shall be unlawful for any person to represent himself or herself to be sixteen years of age in order to attend or remain at any public dance when such person is less than sixteen years of age, and it shall be unlawful for any person to falsely represent himself or herself to be a parent or legal guard an of any person in order that such person may attend or remain any public dance

Section 8. Whenever any public dance is conducted in the City of Ann Arbor the management of said dance shall provide a capable floorman and a chaperone who

shall be a respons ble woman and who shall be in the dance hall at all times and who shall see that no disorderly, familiar or object onable conduct or dancing is allowed.

Section 9. Whenever any pubany dance is being conducted in any dance hall in the City of Ann Arbor, the entire dance hall and all adjoining rooms opening into said hall must be well lighted at all times.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful for any known prostitute, male or female procurer or vagrant to be present at any public dance or at

any public ball room.

Section 11. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation conducting or having in charge any public dances in the C'ty of Ann Arbor, or any person part cipating in said dances, to sell, give away, or drink any intoxicating liquor in or about any dance hall

Section 12. It shall be unlawful for any person under the influence of liquor or drugs to participate in or be admitted to or allowed to re-

main 'n any dance hall.

Section 13 A regular admission fee shall be charged to each individual entering the public dance hall. No free admissions to persons of either sex shall be allowed.

Section 14. Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof in any court of competent jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not to exceed one hundred (\$100) Dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail of Washtenaw county for a term not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 16. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10)) days after the passage and publication thereof by the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

#### RESOLUTION DEFINING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS UPON WHICH THE STREET RAILWAYS ARE TO BE MAINTAINED AND OPERATED IN THE CITY ANN ARBOR

Be it and it hereby is resolved by the Common Council of the City

of Ann Arbor as follows:

-Consent, permission and authority to maintain al street railway tracks and overhead and other equipment now existing in the streets of the city of Ann Arbor and to operate the same as a street railway system including the operation of the interurban cars on the streets where now operated is hereby granted to the Detroit, Jackson and Chicago Railway, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Michigan and known to said laws as a service shal be such as are sufficient street railway company hereinafter referred to as the Company, its successors and assigns. The time of operation and speed of the cars shall be regulated by the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

2.—The Company shall maintain the pavement on the portions of all streets on which pavement has been heretofore maintained by the street

railway and in addition.

(a) Shall reconstruct the tracks on Packard Street from, at or near Granger Avenue easterly to the city I mits and pave between sad tracks and for a distance of twelve inches outside of each rai.

Shall pave Hill Street from East University Avenue to Washtenaw Avenue between the rails and twelve inches outside of each rail

including the switches.

which your Committee recommends outside each rail for the distance tween the lot lines of Street extended and the distance between the lot ines of F.fth Avenue extended.

All pavements to be maintained maintained in the same state of repair as the pavement laid and maintained adjacent thereto by the Ciyt. All tracks not so required to be paved by the Company and not ed at grade by the Company with crushed stone on paved streets and e ther crushed stone or pebble gravel on unpaved streets substantially even with the top surface of the ra.l.

3.—City cars shall be operated with such frequency and of such capacity as may be requisite for reasonably adequate service. The Company shall also maintain and operate busses from the new University hospital, from the time such hospital shal be opened and put in operation, to the nearest convenient point for making connection with the cars of said street railway or such other routes as may be hereafter arranged by mutual agreement. Such cars and busses shall be maintained, heated and ventilated in such manner as may be reasonably necessary the safety, health and convenience of the public using same. The busses shall be deemed to be a part of the street railway system and so treated for all purposes hereof.

4.—The rates of fare for the cty and not more than sufficient for the reasonable requirements of said city system to meet the operating costs, taxes, property retiral and return In determining upon fair value. such reasonable requirements, a reasonable car mileage charge for the use of such tracks shall be made against the interurban cars operated city Arbor. The in the of Ann rate of fare on the busses shall be ten cents. Such fare shall include a transfer to the city cars. Transfers shall be given from the city cars to the busses upon additional payment of the difference between the regular fare and the bus fare.

5.—If the c.ty of Ann Arbor shal at any time, pursuant to lawful authority, determine to engage in the ownership and operation of street railways, the tracks and over operation Shal pave on Detroit Street head and other equipment then in between the rails and twelve inches the streets and the cars and other

equipment then used in the operation of the city service on said tracks shal be purchased by the city of Ann Arbor at the then fair value of such physical property.

6.—The City and the Company shall agree from time to time, up. on the rates of fare upon the basis aforesaid, and in the event of purchase upon the fair value; but if at any time or times the City and the Company shall fail to agree upon the later of fare, or upon the lair value, the same shall be determined by arbitration. The basis of "Fair va ue" in the rates of fare to be used on such arbitration shall be moved. the valuation made by the Michi-Commission, Utilities gan Publ c such valuation being brought to the date of the arbitration. The reference to the Michigan Public Utilities Commission shall be deemed to include the state authority at time having the regulation of street or interurban railways by whatseever name the same may at said time be known and howspever constituted.

7.—No term rights are granted by the City or acquired by the Company hereunder, but the relations between the City and the Company here inder are solely from day to day and may be terminated by the C'ty at any time upon sixty days notice to the Company by Resolution of the legistive authority of the City.

## Officers' Reports City Attorney's Report

City Attorney's Office,

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 30, 1922. To the Honorable, the Common

Council of the City of Ann Arbor: Pursuant to the terms of a resolution presented at a meeting of the Common Council, September 18, 1922, asking for a written op nion regarding the status of encroachment of store fronts, show cases, displays, etc. over the property line. I herewth submit my opinion.

Section 1 of an ordinance entitled,

"An Ordinance relative to the Use of Streets and Other Public places,' passed by the Common Council November 4, 1895; approved November 5, 1895; amended June 5, 1899; amended October 20, 1913; amended September 15, 1919; provides that, whenever any sidewalk shall be obstructed or encumbered by anything, it shall be the duty of the owner or occupant of premises adjacent to and abutting the said sidewalk to move said encumberance or obstruct on or cause the same to be re-

Section 5 provides that it shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works to take cognizance of the provisions of this ordinance relative to the encumbrance of sidewa!ks. streets and alleys.

Section 7 of the ordinance, as amended September 15, 1919, does not permit the use of the sidewalks for any purpose or for display of

merchandise.

It means, therefore, that in accordance with the terms of the ordinance the Board of Public Works shall enforce the violation thereof.
