Ordinance Committee

Ald. Johnson presented the following ordinance which was given its third rading and which included the accompanying map, made a part of said ordinance.

An Ordinance regulating, restricting and districting the location of residences, trades, industries, bus nesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, and establishing the boundaries of districts for the said purposes; providing for and establishing set back I nes and providing for the volation of said ordinance.

PREAMBLE

Whereas, the public in erest, health, comfort, convenience, preservation of the public peace, safety, morals, order and public welfare of the city of Ann Arbor, require the classification of the city into districts within some of which it shall be lawful and within others

unlawful to erect, construct, alter or maintain certain buildings or uses of property or to carry on certain trades or callings.

Now, therefore, the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor

ordain:

Section 1. Definitions.

For the purpose of this ordinance certain terms and words are herewith defined, as follows:

Words used in the present tense include the future; words in the singular number include plural, and words in the plural number include the singular; the word "building" includes the word "structure;" the word "shall" is mandatory and not directory. Any words not herein defined shall be construed as defined in the Housing Code of Michigan, Act 167, Public Acts of 1917, and amendments thereto.

Accessory Building: A subordinate building or portion of main building the use of which is incidental to that of the main building.

Apartment House: See "Mul-

tiple Dwelling."

Boarding House: A building, other than a hotel, where lodging and meals for five or more persons are served for compensation.

Building: A structure having a roof supported by columns or walls for the shelter support or enclosure of persons animals or chartels; and when separated by division walls from the ground up, and without openings, each portion of such building shall be deemed a separate building.

Dwelling, Private. A building occupied by but one (1) family alone.

Dwelling, Single Family: A building occupied by one (1) family alone, having one kitchen, and in which not more than five persons may be lodged for hire at time.

Dwelling, Two Family: A building occurred by but two (2) families alone.

Dweiling. Multiple: A building or portion thereof in which persons dwell otherwise than as a private draing or two family dwelling or as a fraternity or sorority.

Fraternity or Sorority: A building owned by a general or local chapter of some regularly organ-

ized college fraternity or sorority, or by or on its behalf by a building corporation or association composed of members or alumni thereof, and occupied by members of the local chapter of such fraternity or sorority, as a place of residence.

Garage, Private: A garage with capacity for not more than four (4) steam or motor driven vehicles, for storage only, for private use more than two spaces and no which shall be rented to persons not occupants of the premises.

Garage, Public: Any building or premises used for housing or care of more than four (4) steam or motor driven vehicles, or where any s.ch vehicles are equipped operation, repaired, or kept for remuneration, hire or sale.

Hotel: A building occupied as a more or less temporary ab ding place of individuals who are lodged with or without meals, in which as rule the rooms are occupied singly for hire, in whi in provision is not made for cooking in any individual apartment, and in which there are more than wenty-five sleeping rooms, a din'ng room for the accommodation of a least twenty-five (25) guests and a general kitchen.

Lodging House: \mathbf{A} building. other than a hotel, where lodging for five (5) or more persons is provided for compensation.

Non-Conforming Use: A building or premises occupied by a use that does not conform with regulations of the use district in which it is situated.

Place: unoccupied $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{n}$ open space dedicated to purposes of access for abutting property.

Setback: The minimum horizontal distance between the front line of the building, excluding steps and unenclosed porches, and the street line.

Stable, Private: A stable with a capacity for not more than two horses.

Street: A public thoroughfare more than twenty (20) feet wide.

Alterations: Any Structural change in the supporting members of a building, such as bearing walls, columns, beams or girdles, excepting such alterations as may be required for the safety of the building.

Section 2. Use District Regulations.

In order to regulate and restrict the location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, the city of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into "Use Districts." of which there shall be four known as:

- "A"-Residence District.
- "B"-Residence District.
- "C"-Local Business District.

"D"--Commercial and Industrial District.

The City of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into four (4) districts and the houndaries of such districts are shown upon the map attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance, being designated as the "Map of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, 1923, Showing Districts for Use Regulations," and said map and all notations, references and other things shown thereon shall be as much a part of this ordinance as if the matters and things set forth by said map were all fully described herein.

Except as hereinafter provided, no building shall be erected or altered, nor shall any building or premises be used for any purpose other than is permitted in the Use District in which such building or premises is located.

Section 3. "A" Residence D'strict.

In the "A" Residence District shall be that portion or those portions of the city of Ann Arbor in which no building or structure shall be erected, constructed or maintained which shall be used for or designed or intended to be used for any purpose other than that of residence purposes and municipal bu ldings and churches. Excluded-Hotels, buildings des gned for more than two fam lies and with more than two kitchens.

Priva e garages and the usual ou buildings may be located or appurtenant to any maintained building lawfully with n the boundaries of the district here specified, provided that the lne of said building shall not be nearer the street line than the building line in said district and provided further that no such private garage shall bo located or maintained on the front half of any vacant lot Section 4 "B" Residence District.

In the "B" Residence District no

building or premises shall be used and no building shall be hereafter erected or altered unless otherwise provided in this ordinance, except for the one or more of the following uses:

1. Any use permitted in the "A"

residence district.

2. Multiple Dwellings.

3 Boarding and lodging houses.

- 4. Institutions of an educational, religious, philanthrop'c or eleemosynary nature not including penal or correctional institutions.
- 5. Accessory buildings and uses customarily incident to any of the above uses when located on the same lot and not involving a retail business.

Section 5. "C" Local Business District.

In the "C" Local Business District all buildings and premises except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, may be used for any upermitted in the "B". Residence District or for any other use except the following:

1. Bakery.

- 2. Blacksmith or horse shoeing shop.
 - 3. Bottling works.
- 4. Building material storage yard.
- 5. Carting, express, hauling or storage.
- 6. Contractor's plant or storage yard.
 - 7. Coal, coke or wood yard.

8. Cooperage works.

- 9. Dyeing and cleaning works (employing more than five (5) persons).
- 10. Ice plant or storage house of more than eight (8) tons capacity.
- 11. Laundry (employing more than five (5) persons).
 - 12. Livery stable.
 - 13. Lumber yard.
 - 14. Machine shop.
 - 15. Milk distributing station.
 - 16. I laning mill.
- 17. Stone yard or monumental works.
 - 18. Storage warehouse.
- 19. All uses excluded from the "D" Commercial and Industrial District.
- 20. Any kind of manufacture or treatment other than the manufacture or treatment of products clearly incidental to the conduct of a retail business conducted on the premises.

Section 6. "D" Commercial and Industrial District.

In the "D" Commercial and Industrial District all buildings and premises except as otherwise provided in this ordinance may be used for any use permitted in the "C" Local Business District or for any use except the following:

1. Abattoirs.

2. Acetylene gas manufacture.

3. Acid manufacture.

4. Ammonia, bleaching powder or chlorine manufacture.

5. Arsenal.

- 6. Asphalt manufacture or refining.
- 7. Blast furnace for reduction of ore.
 - 8. Dyestuff manufacture.

9. Fat rendering.

10. Fertilizer manufacture.

- 11. Fireworks or explosive manufacture or storage.
 - 12. Fish smoking and curing.
- 13. Glue, sizing or gelatine manufacture.
- 14. Gunpowder manufacture or storage.
- 15. Incineration or reduction of garbage, dead animals, offal or refuse
 - 16 Lampblack manufacture.
 - 17. Petroleum refining or storage.

18. Potash works.

- 19. Pyroxyline manufacture.
- 20. Rolling mill.
- 21. Sm. elters.
- 22 Soap manufacture.
- 23. Storage or baling of scrap paper, iron, bottles, rags or junk, except scrap naturally accruing and incidental to an industrial institution.
- 24. Sulphuric, nitric or hydrochloric acid manufacture.

Section 7. Non-Conforming Uses.

The lawful use of a building existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance may be continued, although such use does not conform to the provisions hereof, but if such non-conforming use is discontinued, the future use of said premises shall be in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

The lawful use of a building existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance may be continued, although such use does not conform with the provisions hereof, and such use may be extended throughout the building, provided

structural alterations, except those required by law or ordinances are made therein. If no structural alterations are made a non-conforming use of a building may be changed to any use permitted in the same use district as that in which the use existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance is permitted according to the provisions of this ordinance, provided that whenever a Use District shall be hereafter changed, any then existing non-conforming use in such changed district may be continued or changed to a use permitted in the same use district as that in which the existing use is permitted, provided all other regulations governing the new use are complied with. Whenever a non-conforming use of a building has been changed to a more restricted use or to a conforming use, such use shall not thereafter be changed to a less restricted use.

Where a building located in a district restricted against its use has been destroyed by fire or other calamity to the ex ent of not more than one-half of its original value, a permit may be granted for its reconstruction within a period not to exceed twelve (12) months from the date of such fire or other ca'amity

Section 8. Setback.

In residence districts there shall be a se back line of not less than twenty-five (27) teet, provided that. when twenty-five (25) per cent or more of all the fron age on one side of a street between two intersecting streets at the time of the passage of thi ordinance has been built up with buildings having a minimum setback line of more or of less than twenty-five (25) feet from the street line, no building hereafter erected or altered shall project beyond the minimum setback line so established; provided that no building shall be required to more than forty (40) feet in any case; and provided further that this regulation shall not be interpreted as to reduce the buildable width of a corner lot facing an intersecting street, held under a separate and distinct owner-hip fro.n adjacen lots and of record at the time of the passage of this ordinance, to less than 24 feet.

In any section of the "C" Local

Business District where 25 per cent or more of all the frontage on one side of a street between two intersecting streets at the time of passage of this ordinance has been built up with buildings having a minimum setback line of more, or of less, than ten feet from the street line, no building hereafter erected or altered shall project beyond the minimum setback line so established; provided that building shall be required to set back more than 10 feet in any case. Section 9. Board of Appeals.

Creation and Membership - A board of appeals is hereby estab-The word "Board" when lished. used in this section shall be construed to mean the board of ap-The board shall consist of peals. 5 members appointed by the city council for a term of three years, and shall include one and not more than two members from each of the legislative and planning departments of the city. The chairman of the board shall be designated by the city council.

All members of the board shall receive such compensation as the Common Council may allow.

Meetings—Meetings of he board shall be held at least once a month and at such other times as the board may determine. There shall be a fixed place of meeting and all meetings shall be open to the public. The board shall adopt its rules of procedure and keep a record of its proceedings showing the action of the board and the vote of each member upon each question considered. The presence of four members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

Appeal—Appeal from the ruling of the building inspector concerning the enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance may be made to the board of appeals within such time as shall be prescribed by the board by general rule. The appellant shall file with the building inspector and with the board of appeals a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. building inspector shall forthwith transmit to the board all the papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed from was taken. The final disposition of any such appeal shall be in the form of a resolution either reversi g, modifying or affirming, wholly

r partly, the decision or determi-nation a scaled from: Stay—An appeal stays all proceedings in furtherance of action appealed from unless the building inspector, from whom the appeal is taken, certified to the board of appeals, after the notice of appeal shall have been filed with him, that by reason of facts stated in the certificate, a stay would in his opinion cause imminent peril to life or property, in which case proceedings shall not be stayed otherwise than by a restraining order which may be granted by the board of appeals or by the circuit court, on application, on notice to the building inspector, from whom the appeal is taken and on due cause shown.

Jursd ct on-The Board of Appeals herein es ablished shall have such jurisdict on as shall be conferred upon tly the laws of the State of Mich gan.

Jurisdiction in Specific Cases— In specific cases the Board of Appeals may, after public notice and hearings, authorize by perm t a variation of the application of the use and district regulations herein established in harmony with their general purpose and intent as follows:

(1) A temporary building for commerce or industry, in a residence district, which is incidental resi lential development. such permit to be issued for a period of not more than one (1) year.

(2) The erection and use of a building or the use of a premises in any location to a public service corporation or for public utility purpose which the board admits by resolution reasonably necessary for the public convenience or welfare.

(3) The interpretation of the provisions of this ordinance in such a way as to carry out the intent and purpose of the plan, as shown upon the maps fixing the several districts accompanying and made a part of this ordinance, where the street layout actually on the ground varies from the street layout as shown on the maps aforesai '.

(4) Interpret the provisions of this ordinance in harmony with their fundamental purpose and intent where practical difficulties or unnecessary hardships occur.

(5) The board shall have the power to call on any of the other city departments for assistance in the performance of its duties, and it shall be the duty of such other departments to render such assistance as may be reasonably requ red.

Section 10. Certificate of Occupancy and Compliance.

No premises shall be occupied or used and no building now or hereafter erected or altered shall be occupied, used or changed in use until a certificate of occupancy and compliance shall have been issued by the building inspector, stating that the building or propo ed use of a building, or premises, complies with all the building and health laws and ordinances and with the provisions of these regu-

Certificates of occupancy and compliance shall be applied for coincident with the application for a building permit and shall be issued within ten days after the erection or alteration of such buildings shall have been completed in conformity with the provisions of these reguations. A record of all certificates shall be kept on file in the office of the building inspector and copies shall be furnished, on request, to any person having a proprietary or tenancy interest in the building affected. No fee shall be charged for an original certificate app ed for coincident with the application of a build ng permit; for all other certificates or for copies of any original certificate there shall be a charge of one dollar each.

No permit for excavation for any build ng shall be issued before application has been made for certificate of occupancy and compliance. Section 11. Plats.

Al applications for building permits shall be accompanied by a plat in duplicate frawn to scale showing the actual dimensions of he lot to be built upon, the size of the building to be erected, and such other information as may be necessary to provide for the enforcement of these regulations. A ca eful record of such applications and plats shall be kept in the office of the building inspector. No yard, court or other open space

provided about any building for the purpose of complying with the provisions of these regulations shall again be used as a yard, court or other open space for another building

Section 12. Interpretation, Purpose and Conflict.

In interpreting and applying the provisions of this ordinance, they shall be held to be the minimum requirements for the promotion of convenience public safety heal h, comfort, prosperity and general welfare. It is not intended interfer€ this ordinance to bv with or abrogate or annul any other covenants or easements. agreements between parties; provided, however, that where this ordinance imposes a greater res riction upon the use of a building premises or requires larger open spaces than are imposed or required by other ordinances, rules, regulations or permits, or by easements, covenants, or agreements, the provisions of this ordinance shall control.

Section 13. Violation, Penalty

Any person, firm or corporation who violates, disobeys omits, neglects or refuses to comply or who resiss the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$25 or more than \$100 for each offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense. On imposition of any such fine the cour shall have power and authority to make a further order and judgment that any such persons so convicted shall be imprisoned in the county jail until such fine and costs shall be paid and such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days.

Section 14. Boundaries of Districts.

Where uncertainty exists with respect to the boundaries of the various districts shown on the maps accompanying and made a part of this ordinance the follow-

ing rules hall apply:

(a) The district boundaries are either screets or alleys unless otherwise shown and where the designation on the maps accompanying and made a part of this ordinance indicating the various districts are approximately bounded by street or alley line, said street or alley line shall be con-

strued to be the boundary of such district.

(b) Where the district boundaries are not otherwise indicated and where the property has been or may hereafter be divided into blocks and lots, the district boundaries shall be construed to be lot lines, and where the designations on the maps accompanying and made a part of this ordinance indicating the various districts are approximately bounded by lot lines, said lot lines shall be construed to be the boundary of such district unless said boundaries are otherwise indicated on the maps.

(c) In unsubdivided property, the district boundary lines on the maps accompanying and made a part of this ordinance shall be determined by use of the scale contained on

such maps.

Section 15. Validity.

Should any section, clause or provision of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section 16. Changes and Amendments.

The City Council may from time to time amend, supplement or change by ordinance, the boundaries of districts or regulations herein established. Any proposed ameniment or supplement or change may be submitted to a committee of the council for its recommendation and report.

A public hearing shall be held by the city council before adoption of any proposed amendment, supplement or change, notice of which hearing shall be given by publishing said notice at least once in ome newspaper of general circuation in the city of Ann Arbor, stating the time and place of such hearing, not earlier than 15 days from the date of such publicat on.

If a protest against any proposed amendment, supplement or change be presented in writing to the city clerk, within ten days from date of last publication duly signed and acknowledged by the owners of 20 per cent or more of any frontage proposed to be altered or by the owners of 20 per cent of the frontage immediately in the rear thereof, or by the owners of 20 per cent

of the frontage directly opposite the frontage proposed to be altered, such amendment, supplement or change shall not be passed except by a three-fourths vote of the legislative body.

Section 17. Enforcement.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced by the building inspector and in the event that a building inspector shall not have been appointed at the time this ordinance takes effect, then the provisions shall be enforced by the city engineer until such time as there shall be appointed a building inspector and the said engineer shall carry out the provisions of this ordinance in accordance with its terms. Appeal from the decisions of the building inspector or the city engineer, in case a building inspector shall not have been appointed, shall be made to the board of appeals, as provided by Section 9.

Section 18. Conflicting Provisions Repealed.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 19. When Effective

This ordinance shall be in effect from and after 10 days from legal publication thereof.
