Your Board of Fire Commissioners has had under consideration for a long time the advisability of placing a fire station in the southeastern part of the city. The number of fires east of State-st. and south of N. University ave. are

about 65 per cent of all the alarms, and we think that the property in that part of the city is entitled to better protection.

The matter of procuring a suitable site is getting to be a serious matter as about all the lots available are being taken up and we deem it advisable to place this matter before the electors at the spring election, to authorize the erection of fire station and the purchase of equipment.

We also deem it advisable at this time to procure site in the western part of the city to be in readiness when fire station may be necessary there.

Ordinance Committee

Ald. Johnson presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading.

An Ordinance to Establish Rules and Regulations Relative to Fairview Cemetery and to Enforce the Provisions Thereof.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

1. The authority and conditions on which lots are sold and the restrictions on transfers shall be made only in conformity with the terms of deeds.

2. The Cemetery Committee, hereafter provided for, desires to

leave the improvements of lots, as far as possible, to the taste of the owners; but, in justice to all, they reserve that right, given them by law, to exclude or remove from any lot any headstone, monument or other structure, tree, plant, or other object whatever which may conflict with the regulations, or which they shall consider injurious to the general appearance of the grounds; but no trees growing within any lot should be removed or trimmed without the consent of the city.

3. Lot owners may have planting or other work done on their lots at their expense upon application to the Sexton. No workmen other than employees of the Cemetery will be admitted to the cemetery (to perform labor) except for the purpose of setting stone work, except by permission from the Sexton.

4. No iron or wire work and no seats or vases will be allowed on lots, excepting by permission of the City, and when any article made of iron begins to rust the same may be removed from the Cemetery.

5. The Cemetery Committee desires to encourage the planting of trees and shrubbery, but, in order to protect the rights of all and to secure the best general results, they require that such planting shall be done only in accordance with the direction of the Sexton of the Cemetery.

6. No coping nor any kind of inclosure will be permitted. The boundaries of lots will be marked by corner stones which will be set by the Sexton with the centres upon the lines bounding the lot. Corner stones must not project above the ground and must not be altered nor removed.

7. No lots shall be filled above the established grade.

8. All interments in lots shall be restricted to the members of the family or to persons whose burial on lot is approved by the next of kin of the owner.

9. No disinterment will be allowed without the permission of the Cemetery Committee and City Health Officer, and the lot owner or the next of kin of the deceased.

10. Mounds over graves should be kept low, not exceeding four inches in height; and stone or

other inclosures around graves will not be allowed.

11. Foundations for all monuments headstones, etc., shall be built by or under direction of the Sexton at the expense of the lot owner and fifteen days notice must be given for the building of foundations. The cost of the same must be paid in advance to the City Clerk of the City of Ann Arbor, and all moneys and funds for all work received by said Sexton or Committee to be paid to said City Clerk.

12. Every foundation must be at least as wide and as long as the base stone resting upon it, and must not project above the surface of the ground.

13. Only one monument will be permitted on a family burial lot.

14. (a) No monument allowed over six feet in height unless approved by the Sexton and the Cemetery Committee.

14. (b) Grave markers or headstones must not exceed two feet in width and one foot in thickness, nor be set more than eighteen inches above the level of the lot. No marker less than six inches in thickness will be allowed, but duplicates of markers already on the lot may be permitted.

15. All stone and marble work, monuments and headstones, must be accepted by the Sexton as being in conformity with the foregoing rules before erection.

16. No monument or headstone, and no portion of any vault above ground shall be constructed of other material than cut stone or real bronze. No artificial material will be permitted.

17. The Cemetery Committee wishes as far as possible to discourage the building of vaults, believing, with the best landscape gardeners of the day, that they are generally injurious to the appearance of the grounds, and unless constructed with great care are apt to leak and are liable to rapid decay, and in the course of time to become unsightly ruins. Therefore no vaults will be permitted to be built unless the designs for the same are exceptionally good, and the construction is solid and thorough. The designs must be submitted to the Cemetery Committee, and will not be approved unless the structure

would in their judgment be an architectural ornament to the Cemetery.

18. Material for stone or marble work will not be allowed to remain in the Cemetery longer than shall be strictly necessary, and refuse or unused material must be removed as soon as the work is completed. In case of neglect such removal will be made by the Cemetery at the expense of the lot owner and contractor, who shall be severally responsible. No material of any kind will be received at the Cemetery after 12 o'clock M. on Saturdays.

19. The Cemetery Committee shall have the right to make exceptions from the foregoing rules in favor of designs which they consider exceptionally artistic and ornamental, and such exceptions shall not be construed as a rescission of any rule.

20. The Common Council shall appoint a committee from its members to be known as the Cemetery Committee whose duty it shall be to carry out the directions of the Common Council relative to the said Cemetery.

21. The Common Council may appoint a Sexton of the said Cemetery upon recommendation of the Cemetery Committee who shall perform the duties of the Sexton thereof and whose duties shall be such as shall be conferred by this ordinance and by such other rules and regulations as shall be from time to time prescribed.

22. It shall be the duty and right of the Cemetery Committee from time to time to lay out and alter such avenues and walks, and to make such rules and regulations for the government of the grounds as they deem requisite and proper and calculated to secure and promote the general object of the Cemetery.

23. The Sexton is directed to enforce the above regulations and to exclude from the Cemetery any person willfully violating the same.

24. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Fifty dollars for each offence and upon imposition of such fine the Court may make a further sentence that in default of payment of such fine the offender may be imprisoned in the county jail

of the county of Washtenaw until the payment thereof for any period not exceeding ten days.

25. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Moved by Ald. Johnson. that public hearing be held December 26, 1923 at 2 o'clock p. m., on proposed amendments to ordinance relative to fire limits and fires and the City Clerk be instructed to publish proposed amendments with notice of hearing.

Railway Committee

Ald. Johnson made oral report that at the request of the Mayor he went to Lansing to endeavor to secure federal aid when it becomes necessary to rebuild certain bridges in the city and a survey would be made in near future. He suggested that City Attorney call attention of League of Michigan Municipalities to advisability of Legislature passing act to aid cities in paying for bridges on trunk lines.
