> Resolved, further, that the sum of Four thousand, eight hundred ninety and 65-100ths dollars for District No. 62; the sum of One thousand, three hundred ninetyeight and 83-100ths dollars for District No. 63; the sum of Eight hundred twenty-five and 53-100ths dollars for District No 64; the sum of hundred twenty and Three 15-100ths dollars for District No. 65: the sum of Two thousand four hundred eighty-one and 56-100ths dollars for District No 66; the sum of Three thousand, six hundred eighty-five and 29-100ths dollars for District No. 67; the sum of One thousand, three hundred forty-nine and 83-100ths dollars for District No. 68; the sum of Three hundred eighty-five and 94-100ths dollars for District No. 69; the sum of One thousand, nine hundred ninety-five and 26-100ths dollars for District No. 70; the sum of Five hundred fifteen and 51-100ths dollars for District No. 71; is hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of such respective public improvements at street and alley intersections and fifty per cent of the balance of cost of such public improvements, all of which sums of money in four equal annual installments, with interest, be and the same are hereby ordered and required to be levied, spread and assessed on and upon each and every of the regular annual assessment rolls of the City of Ann Arbor, and on and against all the taxable property with the said city, in and during the period in which any part of this appropriation and assessment is or shall be payable.
