Regular Session.

City Clerk called attention to typographical error in printed proceedings of April 9, 1925, relative to report of vote on bond issue on page 438, which report should read, majority over 3-5th, "164" in place of "885," and requested that printed minutes be corrected.

On motion of Ald. Jocelyn, minutes were corrected as requested by City Clerk. The minutes of March 30, April 9 as corrected, and April 20, were approved.

Communications.

Mayor's Message.

To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor,
Gentlemen:

According to a custom which has long been established each mayor upon assuming the duties of his office has sent to your honorable body a message containing recommendations with regard to the city affairs and so, in accordance with this custom, I am submitting this message to you.

I desire to congratulate the former mayor, George E. Lewis, upon the successful administration of his duties as mayor of Ann Arbor during his term of office and also the councilmen and city employes who have worked so faithfully in the interests of the city during the same period.

I.

Business Administration.

The thing that every taxpayer is interested in, is a business administration of the city affairs; and there is no reason why every municipality should not operate its affairs the same as any successful business corporation or bank carries on its business. The same degree of study and care should at all times be given to city affairs by department heads that the private individual gives to his own business. It means, therefore, that the city of Ann Arbor should continue to rearrange its method of doing business to get the most good out of the taxpayers' money. The city should move forward at all times and should make improvements necessary to keep it moving

forward. The taxpayer is interested in getting a dollar of value for every dollar paid in taxes.

II.

Budget of Work.

A complete survey of the city should be made and a program laid out to care for the needed public works for the next ten years. The thing that we want to avoid so far as possible is the neglecting to do the thing that should be done at the time that it should be done. One generation should not have to bear the burden of all improvements that should serve for several decades. For illustration, we have confronting us at this time the Allen's creek drain, the proposition of a sewage disposal plant, the problem of our water supply and a complete rearrangement of our sanitary sewer system, besides the usual and necessary extension of utility improvements. It is recommended that the common council and board of public works study the possibility of the City building its own sewers and sidewalks and such other public works of that nature. If it is possible for the city to save money in the doing of this work it means a saving to the taxpayers of this city.

III.

The City of Ann Arbor, Its Parks and Play Grounds.

Ann Arbor is to be congratulated upon having many beautiful drives and boulevards. West Park, Burns park and Island park and other smaller parks are all a distinct credit to the city, but with the increasing population of Ann Arbor and with the increasing valuation of undeveloped lands, it would seem to be good business on the part of the city to procure a large tract of acreage near the city for the purpose of developing it over a period of years for the benefit of the citizens of the city. The time is coming not very far distant when it will be necessary for the municipality to provide suitable landing fields for aeroplanes engaged in air service. There will be a demand for greater playground facilities such as tennis, baseball and football fields, municipal golf and recreation fields and Ann Arbor should have available for this purpose a big park of some two hundred acres. Money spent for parks is money wisely spent. It benefits

everyone in the community and costs very little to the individual taxpayer and it belongs to the taxpayer. Provision should be made to give the board of park commissioners sufficient funds to properly do their work.

IV.

Transportation.

Ann Arbor at the present time is in the experimental stage of its transportation facilities under its agreement with the Peoples Motor Coach company. This problem must be settled within the next year and it is a matter of increasing importance to the citizens of Ann Arbor. Every community develops according to its transportation and this problem should be given very careful study. We are fortunate indeed to be able to go through a year of experimentation without cost to the taxpayer.

V.

Laws and Ordinances.

I favor a strict enforcement of the ordinances of the city and believe that we need more enforcement of the ordinances on our ordinance book than we do in the passage of new legislation, except in so far as it is necessary to care for emergencies which are bound to develop in a growing community.

VI.

Charter Amendments.

It is to be hoped that in the next year the taxpayers of the city will protect their own interests by amending Section 171 of the charter of the city so that the council shall have the right to raise by general taxation on taxable real and personal property for the several general funds of the city more than three-fourths of one per cent on the assessed value. One of the first pieces of business legislation that the city through its voters should adopt is the amendment of the charter to authorize the common council to properly fix its budget to a business program by adoption of this amendment. Undoubtedly the defeat of this particular proposal was due to the fact that the public did not fully understand the meaning of it, for by a refusal to accept an amendment of this character they have automatically paid more money to the state and county. This was unnecessary and needless. Its adoption of the amendment does not mean an in-

crease of taxes but better business based on a business budget.

VII.

Municipal Court

The city should seriously consider the question of a municipal court and investigate the operation of such courts in other cities of the state. A special committee should make the investigation and report its findings to the council. Here the average citizen gets his idea of justice and we should provide for a municipal court if it is found advisable so to do. The court room should be in the city building.

VIII.

City Hall.

It is to be noted that the lack of space in the City hall is beginning to hinder some of the departments in their work. The increasing demands upon these departments requires more room. We should look to the future.

IX.

Activities of Departments.

Particular study should be made in a survey of conditions of the city to prevent duplication of work by the departments. Activities and functions of some of the departments might well be transferred to others. City government is the business of the public and should be made as simple as possible.

X.

Taxpayers Asked to Study Taxation

Taxpayers are asked to study and differentiate between the several divisions of taxation, in their effort to understand our city tax rate and thus consider the state tax; county tax; school tax city tax; and the proportion each bears to the whole yearly tax. Many times the city is blamed for all the taxation, which of course is not fair.

XI

Office Hours.

In order to give the taxpayers of this city an opportunity to express their views in a constructive way in the interests of the city of Ann Arbor I propose to establish an office hour at the city hall from 11 to 12 each day from Monday to Friday, inclusive. In that hour any person who has anything to offer for the benefit of the city will be given an opportunity to be heard.

We all have confidence that the

people of the city of Ann Arbor or any other municipality will come to a correct decision on any public question provided they get all the facts. It should be the business of every department of the city to fully acquaint the taxpayers with all the facts available when considering any municipal program and while this duty is incumbent upon the officials of this city likewise there is a corresponding duty upon the public to ascertain these facts before hastily making a decision. Constructive and helpful criticism is what is needed in any business and the same principles apply to municipal government. I want to firmly impress this point that a business administration is what we all desire and the operation of city affairs should correspond to well managed private business organization where extensions are made when extensions are necessary and reductions are made where reductions are necessary. I appeal for a broad, human, commonsense cooperation in the affairs of the city. Ann Arbor has a good, steady, healthy growth. We do not want to retard it by failure to keep our municipal machinery in good working order and up to date. We are beginning to outgrow some of it and we should look well to the future. Let us consider the city business not by way of platitudes but as an intimate specific business problem.

It is my hope and I feel sure that we can serve together in the best interests of the city. Ann Arbor has an enviable reputation throughout the United States as being a city of clean government. We want to maintain this high standard that has been set and improve on it where it can be improved upon.
