Your Sewer Committee has had the following matters under consideration and respectfully recommends:

That lateral sewers be constructed on Madison st. from Eber White blvd. to Soule blvd., on Soule blvd. from Elder blvd. to the south end of said boulevard and on Elder blvd. from Soule blvd. to the west end of said boulevard; on all streets in Oak Crest Subdivision; on Traver st. from Moore st. to Plum st.; on Brooklyn ave. from Ferdon road east to the west line of lot 14, Fenwood Subdivision on Daniel st. from Summit st. north 200 feet; Boulevard Sub-main, Ridgeway, Harvard Place and Highland road—boulevard sub-main from Huron river to Highland road, from Boulevard sub-main southerly parallel and ten feet east of the west line of Wm. A. Paton, I. Bassett, Eda C. Schlotterback, Edwin M. Smith and Andrew Paton property to a point ten feet south of Andrew Paton's north line; thence easterly to

Ridgeway; thence southerly along Ridgeway one hundred and fifty feet, and from Boulevard Sub-main parallel to and 30 feet west of the East line of Wm. Paton and Ernest Barker property to a point forty feet south of Wm. Paton's and Ernest Barker's south line. On Harvard Place. On Highland Road to serve lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 13 Andrew F. Street Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Street Committee has had the following matters under consideration and respectfully recommends:

1. That the Board of Public Works cause an estimate to be prepared for opening and grading of Daniel-st. from Summit-st. to Chubb road, Edward st from Summit st. to Charles st., Charles st. from Daniel st. to Edward st. and Walnut st. from Spring st. to Daniel st.

2. That the street and sidewalk grades on Vinewood blvd. from Wayne st. to the east line of College Hill Addition and on Berkshire road from Vinewood blvd. to the bend 200 feet south thereof be in accordance with the original plat.

3. That the Board of Public Works be instructed to construct a curb and gutter around the park on Woodside road from Morton ave. to Shadford road, and the

cost of said construction to be paid from the Street fund.

4. That the Board of Public Works be requested to notify the Ann Arbor Railroad Company to prevent dirt from washing down on the sidewalks at all their grade separations.

5. That the plans, specifications and estimate of cost of opening Miner st. from Pearl st. northerly to the north line of Heusel property, as approved by the Board of Public Works June 3, 1925, be approved; and the Board of Public Works is hereby ordered to open, grade and gravel said street, within the limits aforesaid, when the owners of the property abutting on the east side of said street pay to the City Treasurer one-half of the estimated cost.

6. That sufficient money be placed in the Street fund in next years budget to properly lay the dust on all dirt streets and pavements and that the Ordinance Committee be instructed to present an ordinance to repeal the ordinance entitled, "An ordinance relative to oiling unpaved streets and providing a method of defraying the expenses of the same."

On Miller ave. from Gott st. to Seventh st.
