# Water Committee Report

To the Committee of the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your Water Commission is at the present time confronted with a very serious problem, the solution of which is beyond the authority of the Commission.

It has been the desire of the Department to at all times furnish the people with an adequate supply of pure and wholesome water, but the increase in demands is now making it impossible to do so at certain season of the year. Dur-

ing the hot dry seasons, it has been necessary to pump a cnosiderable amount of water from the Huron River. The water pumped from the rver is treated with liquid chlorine and is tested daily so there can be no question of its purity.

The Commission feels that the entire capacity of the Steere Farm supply has been utilized but has proved inadequate in times of maximum demands. The Washington Street station has been discont nued because of the extreme danger of that supply being contaminated, and this has been done upon the advice of the State Health Department.

Studies of increased or additional supply have been made by the Department but the increase in demands have become so serious that we now feel the need of additional expert study and advice. We feel that the Council should employ a competent engineer to make an invest gation and report on the entire matter of water supply.
