**Street Committee  
Pavement Resolution**

Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading and paving of the

following pavement district: District No. 76, on Dexter Ave. from Huron St. to the City limits, within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the grading and paving of the above named district, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore be it

Resolved that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause the above named district, within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayers of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of said public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: all street and public alley intersections and twenty percent of the remaining shall be paid by the city and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting the above named district, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition along with this determination be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works to report to the Council, with all convenient dispatch, suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvement.
