to \$1,389.10, for repairs to city incinerator, which bill was referred to Finance Committee at last meeting.

#### City Engineer's Report

The Honorable Common Council,  
Ann Arbor, Michigan.  
Gentlemen:

I have examined the repairs made to the furnaces at the incinerator and beg lief to make the following report.

I find that both furnaces were entirely rebuilt. The furnaces are of the beehive type and require special brick. The dome of the furnace is built with two arches one of common and one of fire brick separated by an air space. The work of laying the brick was made difficult by the limited amount of room available for the workmen.

I have checked the bill of Weinberg and Kurtz and find that the prices they have charged for labor and materials is the current price for labor and material at this time in Ann Arbor.

From information obtained from Mr. Ed. Besch and Mr. Carl Weinberg. It was thought at first that only minor repairs were necessary, but as soon as the defective parts of the arches were removed the whole arch fell in, making it necessary to rebuild the furnaces. Both furnaces were entirely rebuilt from the grate level up, also the smoke flue.

The furnaces are as good as new now and should last for from five to ten years for rubbish burning. After talking with Mr. Besch I find that these furnaces are giving a real service to the people of Ann Arbor by furnishing a place to dispose of rubbish and refuse such as wooden boxes and waste paper, and inflammable material of all kinds. By keeping this material out of the dumps, it does away with the danger of undesirable fires at these places.

To the best of my knowledge and belief, the bill of Weinberg and Kurtz is correct and the materials itemized in this bill were put into

the furnaces and the labor as stated was performed in rebuilding the furnaces. According to the bill materials cost \$398.95 and labor \$990.15.

I would respectfully recommend that the furnaces be not used for burning large quantities waste automobile motor oil at one time. It is my opinion that burning this oil in large quantities and especially if it came in contact with the fire brick would cause the early destruction of the fire brick arch. However, I see no objection to burning this oil if it is admitted to the furnace in such a way as not to come in contact with the fire brick surface.

Gentlemen: Our general sewer plan calls for a new sewer through West Park from Chapin Street to Seventh Street. The present sewers are too small to take care of the sewage in the development of the property west of Seventh St.

The R. A. Mercier Company is now building the West Park drain and as there is a considerable cut at Seventh Street and as the pavement will be torn up for the new drain, I would suggest that a section of the new sewer be built at this time. It can be built much cheaper now than at a later date as the street will have to be opened up for the storm drain anyway and there would be no extra digging to put in this section of sanitary sewer.

A survey was made of 1659 workers and many recommendations presented, among which "That the Mayor appoint a committee of citizens which shall be asked to consider the above recommendations, to enlist the active efforts of the groups primarily interested such as the workers, contractors, building supply firms, and manufacturers in an effort to minimize the seasonal variations in employment, to invite further suggestions of reme-

dial measures, and to proceed to put into effect such devices as are deemed by them to be feasible and to hold promise of success."
