Whereas, the State Highway Commissioner, in connection with and as a part of the grade separation on Federal Aid Project 74, otherwise known as the Belt Line Cut-Off M-17, is now advertising for construction of the grading for the grade separation approaches at the structure over State Street and over the Ann Arbor Railroad in the vicinity of Ferry Field, and in connection with this work, is to depress State Street a maximum amount of approximately three (3) feet at the crossing of said Belt Line Highway, and

Whereas, the City of Ann Arbor has formally advised the State Highway Commissioner that the City desired to pave State Street, thereby selecting an option provided in a resolution adopted by the said City of Ann Arbor on February 23, 1926, said resolution having been accepted and approved by the State Highway Commissioner, and

Whereas, this paving can not be performed until after the depression of the said State Street and the construction of curb and gutter thereon by the State Highway Commissioner, all of which it is desirable to complete before the close of the season 1928, and

Whereas, the westerly half of this pavement is outside of the City of Ann Arbor and is properly chargeable to the University of Michigan, on whose property it fronts.

Now, therefore, It is hereby resolved:

1. That the City of Ann Arbor does hereby authorize the State Highway Commissioner to prepare plans for and construct and supervises the construction of pavement from the end of the present pavement at Granger Avenue to the south city limits along and on the easterly side of the center-line of State Street, in accordance with type and width and based upon the approximate estimates submitted by the City Engineer to the Board of Public Works with the understanding that before undertaking actual construction, the plans for said pavement shall be approved by and for the City of Ann Arbor.

2. That the City shall reimburse the State for the full cost of the easterly half of said pavement on the basis of periodic estimates to be submitted by the State as the work progresses and on the basis that before awarding of contract, the unit process for the said work shall be first approved by and for the City.

3. That the City of Ann Arbor shall, in addition to the reimbursement to the State for the actual contract costs, pay to the State such an allowance for supervision and engineering as may be mutually agreed upon by the City Engineer for the City and the State Highway Commissioner, following the completion of the work, and that, in addition, the City of Ann Arbor shall, on completion of the work, pay to the State Highway Commissioner a lump sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) as provided in the aforesaid resolution of February 23, 1926.

4. That the State Highway Commissioner shall make all necessary arrangements with the University of Michigan for the construction and payment of the westerly half of the State Street pavement and that the City of Ann Arbor shall be relieved of any cost or responsibility in connection with said westerly half of the State Street paving.
