

About Critics Choice

The following words were Ira Levin's inspiration for Critic's Choice: "I sometimes have visions of a gag conference in which that slick character, who is traditionally known as Manny, bounces in, eyes ablaze, and bubbles 'Listen, this guys a dramatic critic, see; so his wife writes a play. He's got to review the play. Take it from there' ".... Walter Kerr, taken from "How Not To Write a Play".

The word "visions" seems to be an understatement. Walter Kerr could easily have said "I have nightmares", and the world would have understood. Just such a situation as described by Kerr became a possibility when his talented wife, Jean Kerr, took to play writing. As drama critic for the New York Herald Tribune, Kerr could have reviewed Jean's play "Mary, Mary". Of course the play was a fantastic hit, but for the record Kerr removed himself from the arena and Judith Christ wrote the review.

Many Civic Theatre members take part not only in the major productions but also in our Workshop activities. These include classes in acting techniques, lectures on various aspects of theatre by local and visiting experts, and other projects and special events. Running currently through February 4 is a course in Basic Acting given by Marcia Meyer. This will be followed by a new venture: Readers Theatre, a direct acting "seminar" with Nan Conlin in charge,

Last season an exciting new dimension was added to the Workshop Program: movable platforms were built and stage lights were purchased, to make our rehearsal area convertible from one large stage into two laboratory theatres. These new facilities have given our members increased opportunities for acting and directing; and the productions have delighted their audiences.

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Last season the Workshop bill included: Ionesco's "Jack" and "The Future Is In Eggs", Strindburg's "Miss Julie", "Ring Once For Central", and Sartre's "No Exit". During the summer, operations were expanded into a full fledged Workshop Repertory Theater under the direction of Laurel Lee Johnson. The very successful productions were "Auto da Fe", "The Fireburg", "The Private Ear and The Public Eye", and "Uncle Vanya". In December our audiences saw "The American Dream" by Edward Albee. Plans for the year 1969 call for productions on January 25 and 26, March 22 and 23, and May 3 and 4.

Newcomers are welcome here, as they are to all Ann Arbor Civic Theatre activities. Experienced theater persons and rank beginners, there is opportunity for you to learn, to do, and to enjoy with others the excitement that is theatre.
