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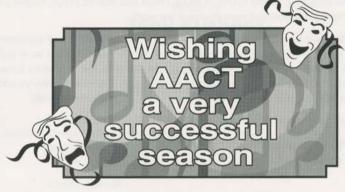
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Hello and welcome...

- Scene 3 Same day, later in the afternoon. Brooklyn apartment of Joe and Harper Pitt.
- Scene 4 Same time as Scene 3. Outside funeral home in New York City.
- Scene 5 Same day, later in the afternoon. Brooklyn apartment of Joe and Harper Pitt and a cemetery near New York City.
- Scene 6 One week later—the first week of November 1985. A men's room in the Brooklyn Federal Court of Appeals.
- Scene 7 Another week later—the second week of November 1985. The imaginations of Harper Pitt and Prior Walter.
- Scene 8 Same day, later that night. Brooklyn apartment of Joe and Harper Pitt and the Manhattan apartment of Louis Ironson and Prior Walter.
- Scene 9 One more week later—the third week of November 1985. Roy Cohn's physician's office in Manhattan.

Intermission

ACT TWO: In Vitro December 1985-January 1986

- Scene 1 Third week of December 1985, night. Apartment of Louis and Prior.
- Scene 2 Same time as Scene 1. Brooklyn apartment of Joe and Harper Pitt.
- Scene 3 Several hours later. A hospital in New York City.
- Scene 4 One hour later. A Manhattan bar and Central Park.
- Scene 5 Three days later. Prior's room in the hospital.
- Scene 6 Two weeks later—the second week of January 1986. A fancy Manhattan restaurant.
- Scene 7 Later that afternoon. Outside the Hall of Justice in Brooklyn.
- Scene 8 Later that night. Central Park and home of Hannah Pitt, Salt Lake City, Utah.
- Scene 9 The next morning. Brooklyn apartment of Joe and Harper Pitt and Prior's hospital room.
- Scene 10 Later that day—sunset. Home of Hannah Pitt, Salt Lake City, Utah.

Intermission

ACT THREE: Not-Yet-Conscious, Forward Dawning January 1986

- Scene 1 Three days later, late night. Prior's apartment.
- Scene 2 The next day. A coffee shop and an outpatient clinic.
- Scene 3 Same day. Antarctica.
- Scene 4 Same day. An abandoned lot in the South Bronx.
- Scene 5 Same day. Roy Cohn's apartment on Manhattan's Upper East Side.
- Scene 6 Same day, later that night. Prior's apartment.
- Scene 7 Same day, moments later. Prior's apartment and Central Park.

About the Cast and Crew

Ericka Schroth (Harper Amaty Pitt, Martin Heller)... A Minnesota native, Ericka came to Ann Arbor as a grad student—and stayed awhile. Roles have included Val

in A Chorus Line, Sheila in Hair, Elizabeth in Six Degrees of Separation, Artie in Eleemosynary, Marguerite in Camino Real, Tuptim in The King and I, and Marian in The Music Man. She is also a pianist and is a member of the piano faculty at Oakland University in Rochester.

Richard Lee Sparks (Joseph Porter Pitt, Prior 1, The Eskimo) is a third-year Junior majoring in theater at Wayne State University. His credits include Scapin (Fingers), Ah, Wilderness (Salesman) and Who Cares? (The Man). He is classically-trained in piano (six years) and trumpet (five years). Dave Wright (Props, Set)... Dave has worked on many Ann Arbor Civic shows. His talents range from stage manager, lights and sound, and of course, acting.

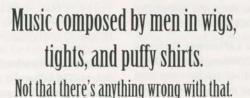


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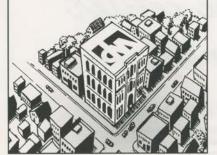
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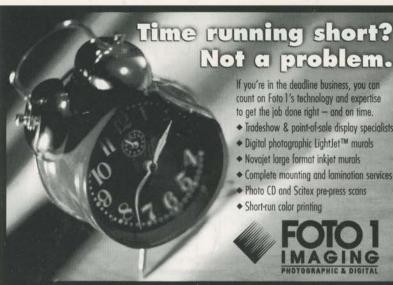
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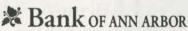


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
