Against this backdrop, two young women, first cousins Lala Levy and Sunny Freitag, prepare for the Jewish social event of the year, Ballyhoo. Simply put, Ballyhoo, is a three-day Southern debutante celebration that culminates in a grand ballroom dance for the rich, Jewish elite.

Lala and Sunny are focused on finding the proper date for the Ballyhoo, and in their comedic search discover lessons about love, bigotry, and the uplifting power of family.



Alfred Uhry, Playwright

Alfred Uhry is the only playwright to win a Pulitzer Prize, an Oscar Award, and a Tony Award. An Atlanta native, Uhry scored big with his first play, "Driving Miss Daisy" taking home the Oscar and the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1988. His next play, "The Last Night of Ballyhoo" landed him the 1997 Tony Award for Best Play.

Uhry's charm for capturing southern humor and wit in his work no doubt came from his Atlanta upbringing. He was a graduate of Brown University and worked for 25 years in the theater as a lyric writer without much success. In 1976, this struggling writer received a surprise Tony nomination for the book and lyrics of "The Robber Bridegroom" but he eventually lost the award to the smash hit - A Chorus Line. In 1986, Uhry decided to give up theater for good and focus on his family. "I had responsibilities. I realized I could have earned in one week of writing TV stuff what I had made in four years in the theatre," he said. Uhry gave the theater one last shot, and that is when Driving Miss Daisy was born, a play based upon the life of his grandmother. The play earned many awards including the 1988 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. For the film version, Mr. Uhry won an Academy Award, and the film itself was voted Best Picture of the Year. Other films include "Mystic Pizza" and "Rich in Love."

The Cultural Olympiad commissioned Mr. Uhry's second play, "The Last Night of Ballyhoo," for the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. The play opened on Broadway in February 1997. It has been chosen Best Play by the American Theatre Critics Association, the outer Critics Circle and The Drama League, as well as winning the 1997 Tony Award. Mr. Uhry's most recent play, "Parade," is a musical about the Leo Frank case the Jewish victim of a 1913 lynch mob, with music and lyrics by Jason Robert Brown.
