

THE NEWS. NATIONAL CAPITAL. Supervising Architect Hill wants to resign. The first installment of the new postal notes has been issued.

Our public debt was reduced about \$5,000,000 during August. During the same month \$11,500,000 were paid out for pensions.

Application has been made to the Marine Hospital several times for the destitute citizens on the island reservation at Pensacola, Fla. Acting Secretary of the Treasury has decided that there are no funds on hand which could be used for that purpose, and that the state of Florida must make good for its own part.

The consular general of the United States at Rome, under date of July 31, has furnished the department of state with an interesting account of a series of contests between combined Italian and Spanish machines manufactured in several countries, in which those of the United States were successful.

Collections of internal revenue for the first month of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, were as follows: From spirits, July, 1883, \$4,730,000; July, 1883, \$5,285,000, and increase of \$519,135, from tobacco, 1883, \$8,316,254, 1883, \$8,293,415, a decrease of \$22,839; from fermented liquors, 1883, \$1,731,510, 1883, \$1,869,151, an increase of \$137,641; from banks and banks, 1883, \$1,007,594, 1883, \$1,000, a decrease of \$1,007,594; from miscellaneous sources, 1883, \$878,858, 1883, \$908,886, a decrease of \$30,028; aggregate receipts, 1883, \$11,875,577; 1883, \$9,161,948, a decrease of \$2,713,629.
