

The Common Council.

At the regular meeting of the common council last Monday night, but little was done aside from hearing various reports. a summary of which we present herewith. Bills to the amount of \$461,37 were included in the monthly report of the committee on finance; \$355. were allowed to the members of the fire department for the past year.
