The Coldwater public school committee The Coldwater public school committee presented a report in the senate the other day commending the management of the school, the board of control and the teach-ars with the most extravagant praise. The report states that the committee thought it would be advisable to dismiss several of the teachers, and on their rec-ommendation this was done.

The report called forth the most fiery de-munciatory speeches that have been made at this session. The report was denounced as a bold attempt to whitewash the insti-tution, and the public would so regard it. The methods of the committee were de-nounced, and in fact the whole business condemned in the most stathing terms. The indignation of the members that the chairman of the committee was asked to withdraw the report. This he did, being fully convinced that if put to vote it would be rejected. The report called forth the most fiery de-

The report met with a similar reception in the house, and the debate resulted in the passage unanimously of a resolution to investigate the scandal.
