"I am firm in my conviction that, while it is a grievous thing to contemplate the two great English-speaking peoples of the world as being other wise than friendly cempetitors in the onward march of civilization and strenuous and worthy rivals in all the arts of peace, there is no calamity which a great nation can invite which equals that which follows a supine submission to wrong and injustice, and the consequent loss of national selfrespect and honor beneath which are shielded and defended a people's safety and greatness.'

AFFAIRS IN TURKEY.

The European powers have so long delayed taking decided measures against the Turks, as to make them now going on in Armenia. The mere fact that helpless human beings are slaughtered in Armenia should be sufficient grounds for interference. 
