The franchise which grants the Water Company exclusive privileges as compensation for these privileges, among other things, that "the said Company shall furnish water for the purpose of washing gutters, and flushing all sewers that may be constructed for \$100 per annum."

And in this connection it may be proper to state that the draught made by the flush-tanks will be evenly distributed to the manifest benefit of both machinery and mains, while the method of flushing with firehose, in addition to a greater consumption of water, would cause periodical disturbances of preasure in the mains, with its attendant flow of iron sediment of which every household knows the inconvenience.







NEWS MISCELLANY.

MESSAGES OF INTEREST FROM FAR AND NEAR.

The Prospect of War Between the Powers The Sultan Stands Firm in a Refusal to Grant Certain Requests.

The presence of a large fleet of foreign war vessels in Salonica bay evidently had the effect of somewhat awakening Sultan Abdul Hamid II from his lethargy for a time at least and he made a pretense of restoring order in the provinces where the slaughter of Armenian and other Christians had occurred. The steps he took do not seem to have been of very great effect, however, as reports from various places show. The powers de-layed any action they may have medi-tated to see if the sultan was sincere in his promises. There has been little change in the nature of the problem before the powers, however. mutual suspicions are acting as drags upon them and delay decided action upon them and delay decided action upon their part, though the belief still prevails that nothing short of drastic measures will bring the sultan to terms for any length of time. The general situation continues to inspire the gravest fears. Telegrams from Marash and Marsovan say that the American and other missionaries there are in the greatest danger. A report is current that the governor of Hadjin had threatened to burn the convent of had threatened to burn the convent of the town and the barley fields sur-rounding. U. S. Minister Terrell has informed the porte that if any of the three American missionaries at Hadjin were injured in any way he would demand and obtain the governor's head. Advices from Sivas assert that when

the Turkish troops sent "to preserve order" arrive there the officials will notify the Armenians to surrender all arms and ammunition and if they are not satisfied that all has been surrendered the troops will be ordered to attack the Armenians The concentra-tion of Turkish troops at Marash continues. The Turkish commander is holding out all sorts of promises for the surrender of the Zeitoun Armenians, but the latter apprehend nothing less than a wholesale massacre if they lay down their arms. The representatives of the powers hold the same views, and the Armenians at Constantinople say that at Zeitoun a battle which will make history will be fought. Probably the most serious feature of

the situation at present is the one re-sulting from the demand which the representatives of Great Britain, Russia, Italy and Austria made to the sul-tan for firmans allowing the passage through the Dardanelles to Constantinople of a second gunboat, to be attached to each of their respective embassies. It is now intimated at the palace that the sultan may decline to grant these demands, and as the powrs consider that more ships in the Bosphorus are absolutely necessary to the safety of foreigners, it is thought possible that they may insist, and in case of a refusal, send additional warships without the permission of the

ships without the permission of the sultan. This is causing more and more uneasiness. Unless Abdul Hamid submits there is likely to be trouble.

VESSELS WRECKED.

Heavy Storm Brings Disaster to Many Craft on the Lakes.

The sudden change from balmy fall to gruff and chilling winter was ac-companied by a howling northwester which swept over the Great lakes in a fury. Many vessels had been warned and Turkey is Still Undiminished—in shelter, but numerous others faced the wind and wave and several suffered

severely as a consequence.

A dispatch from Charlevoix, states that fishermen at the point two miles north reported wreckage coming ashore. One jacket life preserver was marked "Corning." Parts of a vessel's gunwale and cabin were also picked up. It is presumed to be from the Ida Corning which passed Port Huron bound up Nov. 16 in tow of the steamer Oscoda, since when there is no record of her whereabouts. She is owned by of her whereabouts. She is owned by Corning & Ryan, of Saginaw. She carried a crew of seven men.

Later—A telegram has been received stating that the Ida Corning is laid up at Bay City, therefore the identity of the wrecked vessel is unknown. The wreckage is strewn along the beach for three miles.

A message from Camlechie, Ont., 14 miles above Sarnia, states that four bodies have been washed ashore. Nothing is known of a boat being wrecked near there. It may be that the bodies are those of fishermen who

Ketcham reached Port Huron badly wrecked, she having rolled all her masts out, smashing her cabin and most of her deckload was washed overboard. Her hallwarks are hadly smashed and she bulwarks are badly smashed, and she will be taken to Cleveland for repairs. Her consort, the Montgomery, went aground on the Canadian shore and went to pieces. The schooner from Cliff broke away from her steamer, the Iron Chief, and became disabled. She lost her fore-mast, towing chock, windlass, capstan, and the forward pump, and the fore-castle was broken in. The anchor was let go and she brought up five miles northwest of Port Austin, but rode the gale in safety. The steamer W. P. Ketcham and consort, the George B. Bulldings for Cold Storage.

A gentleman addressed the Western New York Horticultural society in the interest of the construction of cold storage rooms for a neighborhood. This system, he thought would make the supply for the market throughout the year more equal to its demands. This cooperative principle may be worked as successfully in this section as in dairying. Speaking from personal experi-

ence, he said: "I have a building that I built for the storage of nursery stock and in which I have had apples stored all winter. It is frost proof, built on heavy stone wall 24 inches thick, and 3 feet high. On this wall were set up 2x4 scantling; these were sheathed with inch hemlock, then covered with tarred building paper, then furred out with strips four inches deep and again covered as before, until the wall has three air spaces; the roof is constructed in the same way to protect against frost; light and ventilation come from two rows of windows at the top; the roof is gravel; the outside is covered with novelty siding; the building has double or two sets of doors at each end, and a driveway through the center; it is painted inside and out; it is 100 feet long by 40 feet wide; the whole cost was \$1,400 and it would afford storage for 10,000 barrels; the atmosphere is the same inside as out only that the building is frost proof and can be run in the winter months with a variation of not over 12 degrees: there is no smell of a cellar whatever and stock always keeps perfectly.

"Such a house, or a better one in a neighborhood would pay four years out of five at least 50 cents a barrel over all costs of labor for handling, sorting, insurance, etc."

Another member said he had a plan for a house for his private convenience. He was about to build a frame 60x30. with a wall of about 18 inches. Shall stud up on the side and have a twostory building, but use a gambrel roof for the second story. Shall board with rough hemlock or studding, paper that and furr it up. This will give three ab chambers and four thicknesses. Dauble windows and close-fitting shutters with an air space (double shutters). He will leave small holes from the wall under the sills on either side and put in cement for the lower floor. He will have the air chambers below the sill in case he wants to scrub the floor or leave them open at night and close up quick. He will have holes through the upper floors for the circulation of air, and two ventilators through the top. With proper circulation such a house will be frost proof in winter and cool in sum mer .-- Ex.

USES FOR COCOANUTS.

Florida Has Several Plantations of This Tropical Fruit.

Quite a number of tropical nuts have ecently been introduced into cultivaionia this country, says the New York World. Already on the east coast of Florida are growing 250,000 cocoanut rees, 42,000 being in one plantation. It is believed that the first trees of this kind in that state sprouted from nuts brought from Central America and the West Indies by the gulf stream. At Key West and about some of the old forts cocoanuts were planted at an early day, as certain ancient trees now standing bear witness. In 1877 a bark beached near Lake Worth. Several of the nuts were s planted, the satisfactory growth of the eedlings giving an impetus to cultiva-

The word cocoanut is derived from the Portuguese "coco," meaning monkey, because the base resembles a monkey's face. The tree was known to the people of Ceylon as early as 160 B. C. the milk being used by them for making cement. The cocoanut is one of the most useful of plants-root, trunk, leaf, sap and nut are made to yield tribute to man. The fiber of the husk furnishes excellent yarn and is preferred to horsehair for stuffing beds, cushious, chairs and saddles. It is stronger and more elastic than hemp. The Polynesians twist small cords of this fiber. which serve in the construction of houses and canoes where Europeans would employ nails. The green nuts are grated for medicinal use. Grated cocoanut forms an ingredient of the East Indian condiment curry. In the Maldive islands labor is usually paid fer in cocoanuts.





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
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
