DISEASES A Whole Regiment of News Items From Michigan Towns

CAPTURED FOR BRIEF READING.

The Death Rate for February in the State the Largest yet Reported by the Registrar System-Hillsdale Undertaker Sold Out and Skipped Out-

3,778 Deaths in Michigan in February. According to reports filed with the secretary of state there were 3,778 deaths in Michigan during the month of February. This is the largest number of deaths recorded since the operation of the registration law, and it corresponds to a rate of 20.7 per 1,000 population. There were 727 deaths of infants under 1 year of age; 212 of children aged 1 to 4, and 1,303 deaths of persons aged 65 and over. The largest mineral poisions and opiates. The number of deaths was from influenza, following letter from a Pittsburg 721; pneumonia, 632; consumption, 196; tuberculosis, 55; typhoid fever, 28; diphtheria and group, 44; scarlet fever, 9; measles, 16; whooping cough, 19; diarrheal diseases, 45; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 74; puerperal septicemia, 23; cancer, 107, and 102 from violence.

Skipped Out and Left His Family.

On the 10th of February Charles W. Eccles, of Hillsdale, left home, telling his wife that he was going to Cleve-land and would be back the next night. Nothing has been heard from him by any one since that time. Mr. Eccles was an undertaker, and a short time before he went away he sold out his business and engaged to superintend the business for his successor. It was ascertained that he did not go to Cleveland, but instead went west. He married his wife in Hillsdale, and she is left with two small children.

Found His Children.

Early last summer the wife of Richard Haenke, of Dushville, deserted him taking the two children with her. Haenke was anxious to recover the children and made several unsuccessful searches for them. Recently he heard that the children had been placed in a children's home in Toledo and he lost no time in going there. He was rewarded for his efforts and the little ones were as happy as the father when they were turned over to him. The whereabouts of the mother is a

Attacked His Wife with Shears. Robt. Thompson, of Three Rivers, in a fit of temporary insanity, attacked his wife with a pair of shears inflicting serious injury. He then made a desperate attempt to kill himself. He was finally secured by offcers and taken to the city jail. Thompson is an expert machinist, and it is thought that overwork and study has unbalanced his mind. His wife is resting as comfortable as could be expected under the circumstances.

31st Michigan Coming Home.

The 31st Michigan regiment will be started homeward as soon as it can be relieved from duty and transports provided. Uncle Sam is already engaged in recuiting a larger regular army, and it is hoped that the volunteers will all be out of Cuba by April 1. Those belonging to volunteer regiments can reenlist in the regular army as soon as mustered out if they choose, with the assurance that they will be sent to

A \$700,000 Land Deal.

A W. Bloom, of Menominee, has returned from New York, associated with eastern capitalists he will purchase 20,000 acres of mineral and timber lands in Houghton, Keweenaw, Baraga and Marquette counties. The consideration is over \$700,000. The corporation is to be organized with a capital stock of \$5,000,000. Prospectors are at work, and copper mines are being located.

R. R. Taxes Will Reach \$1,000,000. Commissioner Wesselius reports that prisoners. the Michigan earnings of railroad companies for December were \$2,750,979, an increase of \$383,737 over December, 1897. The total Michigan earnings of the year, were \$31,646,879, an increase of \$3,365,402, or 11.9 per cent over 1897. It is estimated that the increase in taxes will be 15 per cent, making the total revenue this year about \$1,100,000. | signs of weakness

WAR NOTES,

It is said to be the intention of the navy department to send 1,000 marines to Cavite to take care of the navy's interests there. This seems to be a very large number of marines to station at one navy yard, but the explanation is that the Cavite station is the largest in the possession of the United States, including about 70 square miles of land with 13 miles of water front. On the government lands are many squatters and some small towns, and a large number of men wil be required to thoroughly police the territory.

A change in the command of the United States forces at Iloilo will occur on March 27 resulting from the retirement of Gen. Marcus Miller who or that date reaches the age limit of 64 years. Gen. Miller's compulsory re tirement is a matter of regret to the war department. He will be succeeded in the natural order of promotion by Cot. Thomas M. Anderson, who now ranks as a brigadier-general of volun

The advance movement has now been commenced by the American troops and will be continued until Malolos the capital of Cuba, is taken. The first move in the advance was made by Gen. Wheaton, who after a hard fought battle, succeeded in capturing Pasig. The engagement lasted one hour. Insurgents lost 30 killed; Americans, 3 killed and 14 wounded.

Another engagement has taken place near Manila. Gen. Hale, determined to clear away the enemy from the right front of his wing, met with fierce fighting but the American casualties are light. It is estimated that at least 250 rebels were killed and 19 insurgent sharpshooters laid down their arms without firing a shot and were taken





PARENTS' PROBLEMS. I have a little boy seven years old. He has never been very strong. Lately I have noticed that his face twitches What is the cause and what can I do MRS L. B H for it?

It may simply be a habit acquired through imitation of some one so affected. More than likely it is a symp tom of a disturbed condition that may result in St. Vitus dance Do not call the child's attention to the trouble but carefully observe his general health. Is he unusually irritable? Is he restless in his sleep? Is be cons ipated? Is his articulation impaired? Is there twitching of the arms or legs?

These questions answered in the affirmative will indicate that it is more than a habit acquired through imitation and suggest that the case needs attention at once.

The most important measures are

those that pertain to improving the general health by attention to his diet, condition of bowels, outdoor exercise and freedom from nervous strain. His food should be plain but nourishing. All highly seasoned to ds should be forbidden, also tea and coffee.

The disease is not fatal and is usually cured more promptly by hygienic measures than by drugs.

The child should probably not go to school. He should be kept pleasantly employed in open air, but not allowed to get over fatigued even by play. He should not be indulged because of his infirmity. A firm authority over him will be one of his best aids. He however should not be teased or irritated and life should be made as serene and pleasant as is possible with the enforcement of a prompt obedience.

Will you please describe a hygienic wardrobe for an infant?

MRS. G. R. N.

The great essentials for a healthful outfit for an infant are warmth and freedom. The old-fashioned style of dress with roller-band and skirt bands was lacking in both of these essentials. It interfered in a very harmful way with both freedom of limb and of lungs and did not secure adequate warmth.

Perhaps the most desirable first wardrobe would be composed of a number of soft wrappings in which the baby could be enfolded without being obliged to submit to the process of dressing in garments with sleeves. I had the satisfaction a few days ago of arranging such an outfit which I desigswaddling clothes of Scriptural times and of the present fashion on the Continent of swaddling.

For the first three or four weeks it supplies complete warmth and entire freedom. As soon as the child is large enough and strong enough to be dressed, the most healthful garments coffee. Yet coffee is dear to many. To are those which do not compress the body in the least nor hang as weights upon the little limbs. The old fashioned roller-bandage should be entirely dis-Science has turned the healthful pensed with from the first. A series of slips simple in style and without trimming, fitted one inside the other, are the most easily placed in position and the most comfortable for the child. The first one of flannel is the smallest in size. This is simply a plain slip with sleeves. The next one of cotton is just a little larger and may be made without sleeves; the dress a little larger than this one, still of the same style can be trimmed with a little soft lace. By putting the sleeves of each garment one inside the other all three can be put on the child at once, obviating the necessity of turning and twisting which must be so uncomfortable to the baby. A very ingenious little shirt has been devised to act both as shirt and band.

Mothers who have used wardrobes made after this fashion are very hearty in their praise of its comfort and its ease of adjustment. I am quite sure if the babies could speak they would add their tribute to this testimony.
