**VERDICT OF 5,000.00** 

THAT WAS THE VERDICT FOR MISS COREY.

City Will Probably Appeal the Case-Final Conclusion will Not Be Reached for Some

The jury in the case of Miss Corey against the city gave the plaintiff \$5,000 damages. The case was stubbornly contested. It was shown that a hydrant had been allowed to run all night in the yard of the property belonging to Mrs. Rockwell on E. William street in the month of February in 1898. The night being cold the water had caused ice to form on the sidewalk upon which Miss Corey had fallen the next evening and sustained injuries from which she will never recover and which totally incapacitates her from work. The question was as to whether the city was liable. An attempt was made to take the case from the jury but Judge Kinne finally decided not to do so. The result was that the jury decided that Miss Corey was entitled to city will appeal the case to the Supreme Court. As a result it will be some time yet before the case is settled.

### WORST FIRE IN YEARS.

MACK & CO'S FURNITURE STORE BURNED MONDAY.

\$40,000-Insurance \$38,000-Fire Started In Upholstering Room In 3rd Floor-Fire Department Did Good Work.

At 3:45 Monday afternoon fire broke out in the handsome business block occupied by Mack & Co. as their furniture and bazaar store.

The origin of the fire was in the rear of the top story, where most of the ex celsior and cotton butting was stored Just what caused the blaze could not be learned. By the time the department reached the scene the rear portion of the upper story was ablaze, the material which is stored there catching up and spreading the fire with rapidity.

A stream was turned on the Liberty st, side of the block and Fireman Mc Laren, who was No. 1 man on the ladder on Main st., reached the upper messessessessesses windows. Knocking one in he turned on a stream and endeavored to enter. The smoke was so dense, however, that it drove him back.







Treasury Report for April.

The U. S. treasury receipts for April fell \$15,400,000 below those of March, while the expenditures were \$22,800, 000 more than those of the month previous. The receipts for March were increased by the payment to the government of nearly \$12,000,000 on account of the Pacific railway settlement, while the expenditures for April were increased by the drawing of warrants for the payment of \$20,000,000 to Spain. For April the receipts were \$41,611,587 and the expenditures, including the payment to Spain, were \$65,854,000, showing a deficit for the month of \$24,242,412. The receipts from customs were \$17,645,945, from internal revenue \$22,207,099, miscellaneous \$1,758,541. The deficit for the fiscal year to date amounts to \$109, 300,288, but the probabilities are that the deficit for the entire year will not be in excess of the estimate of \$112, 000,000 made by Secretary Gage in his annual report.

Fifteenth Annual Report.

The civil service commission, in its 15th annual report, says that the total number of persons examined during the year was 45,712, of whom 30,600 passed. This was a decrease of 4,859 in the number examined and a decrease of 5,985 in the number who did not pass, as compared with the previous year. In the departmental branch of the service 2,100 persons were appointed through educational examination and 2,336 through the non-educational or registration examinations. Two hundred and two persons were appointed in the custom houses, 2,758 in the postoffice, 229 in the internal revenue offices, and 225 in the government printing office. The commission also issued certificates for the reinstatement of 1,133 persons during the year.

The drain law provides that the company shall make the necessary opening and put in and maintain at their own expense a suitable culvert. The railroad company contend that the statute requiring them to do this is taking private property for public use without compensation. The company brought suit to test the constitutionality of the statute, with the above result. The case will be ap-

The supreme court decision invatidates the Atkinson railroad law, as well as the law of 1881, which provides for the assessment of railroad, telegraph and telephone companies. The provisions in this law are exactly similar to those in the Atkinson bill, providing for the assessment of railroad, telegraph and telephone companies. The case under discussion was that of the Tecumseh Telephone Co. The court declared the tax to be ad valorem and not specific, and that the auditorgeneral had no authority to credit the money collected under the law to the primary school fund. But the contention that the tax can be collected as an ad valorem tax, the court says, cannot be sustained. It is not a specific tax and is not within the rule of taxation prescribed for other property therefore, the law is void. This practically disposed of the Atkinson law. and brings the matter of increasing the taxation of railroads again before the legislature.

The senate in executive session confirmed the following appointments of the governor: W. A. Perren, of Detroit, member of the Mackinac Island park commission for 10 years; Fred C. Bowerfind, of Adrian, member of the board of guardians of the Industrial h ne for girls; John Devener, of Lav r. member of the board of control he asylum for the feeble minded an leptie; Dr. A. L. Worden, of Det it. member of the state board of corrections and charities; Wm. Moeller, of Detroit, jury commissioner; Herman Nagel, of Detroit, member of the grade crossing board.

Gov. Pingree has appointed Charles Furnbarn, of Ishpeming, to succeed himself on the board of control of the upper peninsula for the insane. Sanford N. Dutcher, of Newberry, has been appointed to succeed George L. Loope, of Bessemer, on the same board. James Russell, of Marquette, is given the appointment of commissioner of mineral statistics to succeed George A. Newitt, of Ishpeming. Mr. Russell may not accept the position, as he thinks it would interfere with his newspaper work too much.

The senate has confirmed S. N. Bickerstaff, of Kalamazoo, whom Gov. Pingree named for member of the Kalamazoo asylum board over two months The senate also confirmed Walter H. Bills for member of the Jackson prison board, and G. Willis Bement, of Lansing, for member of the board of control of the state school for the blind. Ald. Moeller's nomination for member of the Wayne county jury commission is still hung up.

The ways and means committee of the house have passed the annual appropriation bills for the Mt. Pleasant Normal school and the Eastern asylum for the insane. The Normal school receives \$50,000 for current expenses, \$40,-000 for buildings and \$3,000 for land, a cut on the total asked for of \$7,120. The Pontiac asylum gets \$77,000 for new buildings and furnishings and sundry expenses, a cut of \$17,500 from the es-

In reply to Heineman's resolution, Auditor-General Dix sent a communication to the house that the state has invested \$2,716.50 up to date in determining the title of the St. Clair Flats; \$2,375 for attorney fees and the rest for witnesses and expenses, in three suits against Don M. Dickinson, the Old Club and Adolph Sloman. Two of the suits the state won, and the other is pending.

Gov. Pingree declares that he will not sign a bill increasing the rates in the Merriman bill, should one be passed, and unless the legislature passes a constitutional bill drafted along the lines of the Atkinson law, he will keep it in session all summer.

Judge Speed will draft the new railroad tax bill. It will be the Atkinson measure with unconstitutional features omitted, and will insure local taxation of railroads.

The equal suffrage bill has again been defeated in the house. The vote stood 51 to 42

He explained that former members of the Cuban military assembly, led by Mayai Roderiguez, Manuel Sanguilly, San Gaulberto and other malcontents, who had organized a majority of the officers against him apparently, and though he (Gomez) might persist and possibly carry the payment to successful conclusion, he was disgusted and wished to wash his hands of the whole busi! ness. Therefore, he thought if he left Gen. Brooke free, the latter would be able to act with equal effectiveness alone. Gen. Brooke will cause a forcible disarmament of the Cuban troops, provided the events of the next two or three weeks show that such action is


