MRS. FREEMAN GALPIN DEAD. Lived in Washtenaw For One Half a Century—Her Loss Mourned by a Large Circle of Friends.

Mrs. Mary Ruthuff-Galpin was born in the state of New York the 31st day of January, 1834, and died in the township of Superior, Washtenaw county, Mich., early Sunday morning, May 14th, being a little over 65 years of age. While still a child she came to Michigan with her parents and settled in Washtenaw county, where she spent the remaining years of her life. Feb. 20th, 1853, she became the wife of Freeman Galpin and to them were born eight children, two sons and six daughters. Four of the daughters have preceded their mother to the better land. Four children remain to mourn the loss of mother, Rev. Wm. Galpin, of Elkhart, Ind., Linus Galpin, of Salem township, Mrs. Fredric Judson, of Dixboro, and May Galpin who with her father are left in the home mourning, and who must now learn to do without the best, the kindest and noblest of earthly treasures, a Christian wife and mother. For many years she has been identified with the cause of Christ, and a consistent member of the Methodist Episcopal church. Not only has she been a true mother to her own precious children but, as her youngest sister said the other day, "She was the only mother I ever knew, for my own mother died when I was but a babe," others too, have felt and listened to the kind and motherly advice of sister Galpin and not only will she be missed by the immediate family but the whole community feel that they too, have lost an intimate friend. She was not a woman whose Christian experience was such as to give her mountain height joy one day and the valley shadows the next, but she was one who always was the same. She possessed a sweet, quiet, earnest and unostentatious spirit. Delight in her own work, yet always ready to lend help and sympathy to those in need. Her enemies cannot be found. The home in which she lived was one of the pleasantest homes to be found. Her now heart breaking companion says of her, "She never spoke one cross word to me, and we never had occasion to utter one harsh or cutting sentence."

In the Aid Society she has planned and sacrificed. She has held various positions of honor and trust, and all duties have been discharged faithfully. She has gone, but her memory, her deeds, her influence remain. Heaven is not so far away as once it was, and sometime we can almost see the city spires, the streets and the gates of the New Jerusalem. The funeral was held from the family residence on Tuesday at 2 p. m. The large house and spacious lawn were crowded with friends met to pay a last act of love and esteem. The services were conducted by her pastor, Howard A. Field.
