Judge Cooley on the XVIIth Amendment. From the Baltimore Sun, March 8.

Justice Cooley, of Michigan, delivered his sixth law lecture at the John Hopkins University yesterday evening, on the fifteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States.

It is doubtful if any citizen can be removed in proportion as it denied the right to vote to citizens except for crime. These articles do not prevent several of the States from affixing conditions to the exercise of the right of suffrage.

THE WEST. It is reported from the Far West that Sitting Bull and his followers are on the verge of starvation, and have notified Gen. Miles that they are anxious to surrender. Several parties were frozen to death in Wyoming Territory during the late terrible snow-storm, and cutting trails in Chicago for the year ending Feb. 28, 1878, show a total, in round numbers, of 1,000,000 hogs packed and cut up—something over 1,000,000 in excess of any previous year.

NAVIGATORS through the Straits of Mackinac passed earlier this morning, before, so far as the records show. The first vessel of the season passed through on the 16th of March. In 1871 the straits were opened as early as April 3, and that was commensurate with the time as a remarkable circumstance.

CHICAGO papers announce the death of O. A. Willard, editor-in-chief of the Evening Post, He was 43 years old. Advice from the north-west, by way of Manitoba, report that Sitting Bull's band are near the border, and pay little attention to it in the pursuit of buffaloes, frequently crossing to this side.

THE SOUTH. A fearful earthquake prevailed at Columbus, Ky., at 4 o'clock on the morning of March 12. The shocks were numerous, and the houses, to roll beds and break down, to turn over safes and presses, smash them, to ruin locomotive bells. A portion of the Mississippi bank collapsed, in leaving a ragged edge. All the people were suddenly awakened and badly frightened. Two very different shocks of considerable force were felt at New Orleans, on the same day.

FOREIGN NEWS. A rumor is current in London that England and the entire Russian Turkish treaty shall be submitted to the conference for consideration and approval, and that Austria is ready to join England in an alliance. Russia has acquiesced in the proposition to admit Greece to the congress. Forty miners were killed by an explosion in a coal pit near Bolton, England, a few days ago.

A Constantinople dispatch says the Armenian intend to petition England to obtain for Turkish Armenia, at the congress, autonomy under a European guarantee or protection; otherwise they fear Russia will encourage Turkish misgovernment in order to furnish a pretext for Russian intervention of the entire province. A grant of nearly 4,000,000 florins has been voted by the Hungarian delegations for lunatic asylums in certain parts of the empire, deemed urgent by the Austrian Cabinet. The Grand Duke Nicholas' visit to the Sultan has been postponed until after the treaty of peace is ratified.

A FRENCH cable is reported from the city of Brest, in France. By the capsizing of a large thirty-six persons, who were attending a fair, were drowned.

LATE advices from Cuba state that Venoto Gomez has proclaimed himself Dictator, and has assumed the government of the revolution, and has marched to the relief of Maceo, in the Eastern Department, in the company of Bolivar Peraza. Russia offers to the Bulgarians to send them arms, and to give them the Empress. It is not likely that this choice will suit England and Austria any better than the choice of the Czar's dealings with the results of the war.

A CABLE dispatch announces that Russia, at the instance of Bismarck, has consented that the coming congress may decide whether the entire treaty is to be submitted to the conference, or to whatever decision shall be reached. A Vienna dispatch says that negotiations are proceeding in certain quarters, and that the Austrian Cabinet is ready to accept of an alliance between England and Austria. A fire broke out at 10 o'clock in the morning, at one of the relief yards established outside of the city for the benefit of the famine sufferers. A strong northeast wind was blowing at the time, and scarcely an hour passed before all the sheds were burned, and between 2,800 and 3,000 women and children were suffocated or burned to death.
