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NEWS OF THE WEEK.

MICHIGAN.

The Kalamazoo Asylum investigating committee has adjourned till April 8. The Michigan State Dental Association met at Ann Arbor Wednesday and held its usual annual elections, discussions, etc.

John Adams, of East Saginaw, has inherited an estate in Kentucky valued at \$175,000, and will come into possession of the same this fall. The commencement exercises of the Homeopathic College of the University took place Wednesday evening in University Hall.

A dispatch from Sebewaing says that the room at the Sebewaing Hotel, on Tuesday night, and his two children, who were sleeping in the house, burned to death. Their deaths were absent at the time. No further particulars.

The room of Andrew Tallberg at Ann Arbor was held Wednesday evening and between 8000 and 10000 persons were present. Lives at Lansing but has been all winter in the University hospital.

The postmaster at Mattawan has been re-elected to his office for the term ending on the 31st of March. Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Tenney, of Lansing, celebrated their silver wedding, Friday evening at the residence of the Hon. O. M. Barnes.

Patrick Gorman, of Tallmadge, Ottawa county, probably the oldest man in Michigan, died at his residence in that county, Friday, the 22d, after a great suffering. His family remains in a critical condition.

Edward Hoar, the man who was recently arrested in Jackson and taken to Fort Austin, Huron county, to answer a charge of murder, has been released, the case against him evidently being without foundation.

The people of Monroe county are to decide by vote whether they proposed new court house be built at Monroe or Dundee. The Michigan delegation were somewhat surprised to find that the Hon. J. W. Aldrich, of Michigan, was nominated for a third term at the House of Representatives.

The Sioux City Journal has starting reports of the ravages of destructive prairie fires up to the big Sioux Valley, and south of the Dakota. The fires on Saturday were of unusual force, and destructive beyond precedent.

Deramus Aiken, of Charlotte, shot his wife at the depot, Grand Rapids, Saturday night, inflicting fatal injuries. One bullet passed through her windpipe and two through the chest. The murderer escaped.

About 7:30 o'clock Saturday night the east-bound passenger train on the Grand Trunk Railway was thrown from the track between Jackson and Sturgis. The train was jammed between the tender and the first car.

The Commissioner of Patents has decided that the fence constructed of wire and wooden slats, of which considerable is being built in this State, is not a new invention, and is not patented and the patent has expired.

John Haire, living near Sebawa, accidentally killed his wife Sunday night at Sturgis. He was getting over a fence when his gun was discharged, and the charge of small shot penetrated near the heart of his wife.

During the year 1878 the expenses of maintaining the State Prison exceeded the receipts by \$1,281,128 10, divided as follows: Floor, \$1,248,400; meat, \$30,229; grain, 20,847; 508.

A horrible accident occurred March 16 near Northport, by which Mrs. Hiram Taylor lost her life. It seems that she was living alone with her child, about a year old, her husband being absent on a business trip.

Henry Hines and Michael King were arrested for removing the plate which caused the accident on the Grand Trunk. They were brought to Port Huron and lodged in jail. They were both formerly employed by the Grand Trunk, and were discharged.

FOREIGN.

A recent fire at Akyah, farther India, which was accidental, destroyed the native portion of the town. The loss is estimated at \$500,000. The famine in Upper Egypt continues to terrify and afflict. In some villages, people naked like dogs, beg for food.

A Constantinople dispatch says that the Turkish Government will not receive a present amount of taxes until May. The money in hand is barely sufficient for to-day, and no one can say how the government is to be carried on.

The Reichstag has unanimously adopted a motion to request the Emperor to issue a decree for Alsace-Lorraine. During the debate Herr Schlegel declared that he had adopted the motion, and that he would vote for the resolution.

A dispatch from South Africa on March 11 reports that the Government has issued a proclamation. Several native runners, induced by large rewards, started for Ekowe and reported the results of their mission.

Proctor & Gamble's candle factory in Cincinnati, was partially destroyed by fire Tuesday, March 27. The loss is estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000.

Edgy Case & Co., stove manufacturers, of Troy, N. Y., have failed. Their liabilities \$30,000, nominal assets \$12,000.

March 26—Various bills were introduced in the Senate one by Mr. Pendleton, that the principal officer of each executive department may occupy a seat on the floor of the Senate.

Mr. Frye gave notice that on Monday next he would move to suspend the rules and adopt his resolution.

March 27—In the Senate Mr. Hoar's resolution of Tuesday, declaring the course of the majority revolutionary, etc., was taken up.

Mr. McCook (Rep., N. Y.) suggested a difficulty in the bill, and that he would suggest a break out in some quarters, and if the President, in reply to a call from Democratic Governor, should send troops, while there is no provision made for the expense of such transportation of troops.

Mr. Stephens (Dem., Ga.) obtained the floor, but stated that he was unable to read the report of the whole on the Army Appropriation Bill.

Mr. Tucker (Dem., Va.) offered an amendment repealing the law which prohibits any military or naval force from being employed in the civil service of the Confederate States from being appointed to a position in the army of the United States.
