ACT I

Excited guests are arriving at the home of Herr Stahlbaum whose Christmas party for his son Fritz, and daughter Clara, is an annual event bringing together family and friends, and the most eagerly awaited guest of all, Drosselmeyer, Clara's Godfather.

Mysterious chords announce the arrival of Drosselmeyer who enchants the gathering by presenting the magical dolls, Harlequin, Columbine, and the Toy Soldier to perform for the guests.

For Clara, Drosselmeyer has a special gift, the Nutcracker Doll, which Fritz snatches from her and breaks. Drosselmeyer magically repairs the doll and the guests join in a final dance before departing.

Unable to sleep thinking of her Nutcracker Doll, Clara steals into the drawing room and finds it—the clock strikes 12, Drosselmeyer appears and the whole room is transformed. Huge mice appear to do battle with the toy soldiers, but Clara wins the battle by hitting the Mouse-King on the head with her shoe. The Christmas tree begins to grow and the Nutcracker Doll is transformed into the Sugar Plum Cavalier, who takes Clara on a journey to the Kingdom of the Sweets. To reach their destination they pass through the enchanted Land of Snow where Clara is introduced to the Snow Prince and Princess.
