SEWERS.

To the Common Council:

Your comimttee on sewers to whom was referred the report of the City Engineer relative to the construction of a lateral sewer on and along Hill street, beg leave to submit the following report:

That we have examined the profiles and report of the City Engineer and we are of the opinion that a lateral sewer on Hill street east from the main sewer is a necessary public improvement, and that the same ought to be constructed, commencing at the main sewer and running southerly along Division street, thence easterly on Edwin street to State street, thence northerly on State street to Packard street, at which point three branches start, one northerly on State street two on Packard street, one running northwesterly, and one southeasterly on Packard street, said branches being the chief outlets of the remainder of the district, the route of these branch sewers and the entire district being delineated on the map of District No. 3. Your committee approve the bounderies of the district and recommend that the

The discipline of the force has been somewhat improved during the year, and our police have been very diligent as a whole in the discharge of their duties. The force justly deserves the commendation of your honorable body and of the citizens generally.

I think that it will be conceded by all fair minded persons that this department has been successful in a large degree during the past year in accomplishing the objects for which it is maintained, that is for the enforcement of the city and state laws within the city so as to ensure peace and good order upon our streets, for the arrest of persons violating the law, and for the protection of property. Our city has been remarkably free from the depredations of the criminal classes, a result due both to the peaceful disposition of our citizens and to the vigilence of the police. We have had but few cases of robbery comdared with other cities of our class. While the financial unrest which has prevailed throughout the country for some time has thrown many men out of employment, still crime has been much less here than in many cities much smaller than ours, and the larcenies committed here were of a petty character, and in almost every case the offenders were brought to justice.

In conclusion, the thanks of this department are due to your honorable body for the active encouragement and prompt attention that it has always received at your hands. The thanks of this department are also due to Mayor Darling for the kind and personal attention that he has always given to the matter of bringing it up to a high degree of efficiency. He has been ceaseless in his efforts to bring this important branch of the city government up to a superior degree of excellance. I am personally much indebted to every

member of the police force for their strict attention to their duties, and particularly to David Collins for many valued services.

Called to order by President Hiscock. Roll called. Quorum present.

Absent, Ald. Moore, Koch.

Ald. Brown moved a call of the council.

Present — Ald. Maynard, Allmendinger, Snyder, Laubengayer, Brown, Ferguson, Taylor, Shadford, Prettyman, Coon, Butterfield, Cady, President Hiscock, also Albert M. Clark, the respondent.

Ald. Koch entered.

The President called the attention of the Alderman to the fact that he had detained the ceuncil and asked him what excuse he had to offer.

Ald. Koch stated that his business had been condemned, and that thereby interests had detained him and asked and through such corrupt influence I

the pardon of the council for his action. which resulted in the detention of the business of the council.

The answer of Albert M. Clark, President of the Board of Public Works, of the City of Ann Arbor, to the charges exhibited against him by Charles H. Manly, an elector and then member of the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

ANSWER TO CHARGE I.

Charge first is couched in the following language, "First. With official misconduct in the performance of the duties of his office."

The gravamen of the language under this charge is that, as President of the Board of Public Works, I voted to use in the construction of the lateral sewers what are known as Jackson tile and that I did, after a part of said tile had been laid and the contractors had more on hand to lay, cause said tile to be condemned and rejected by my vote and influence on said Board.

That immediately after this action, a representative of the Jackson Sewer Tile Company, one Smith, came to the City of Ann Arbor and visited me and promised me five per cent. of all the moneys to be paid by the City of Ann Arbor, for said tile, to said contractors, if said tile were used in the construction of said lateral sewers; and that thereafter and on the 20th day of October, 1894, by my vote and influence I caused a resolution to be passed by the Board of Public Works allowing the use of said Jackson sewer pipe or tile which had been condemned, and that thereby and through such corrunt influence I
