FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Office of the Chief of the Fire Department Ann Arbor, April 15th, 1898.

To the Honorable the Board of Fire Commissioners.

Gentlemen: I herein submit to your Honorable body my ninth annual report as Chief of the Fire Department in which I give a concise review of the work performed by the Department during the year ending March 31, 1898,

and the expense attached thereto deferring comments and recommendations until they become necessary for the maintainance of the efficiency of the Department.

The number of alarms responded to during the year is fifty-nine (59) the cause of which was as follows:

Chimney Fires causing slight or no damage, 13; false alarms, 3; gasoline stoves, 7; tipping over lamp, 3; incendiary, 3; spontaneous combustion, 2; kettle of tar, 2; unknown, 1; a call from the village of Dexter and one from each of the following causes: ash barrel, ashes from tinner's stove, burning brush and rubbish, cigarette, clothing in contact with cook stove, defective fire place, electric wire, explosion of ether, fire works, gas jet, holding lighted match to measure gasoline, leak in gas pipe, overheated stove, plumber's stove, pouring gasoline in stove to start fire, railroad collision, stove pipe falling down, throwing lighted match in basket of waste paper, thawing water pipe with paint burner, and tramps. Of the above alarms forty-five (45) were by telephone and five were run direct to the engine house.

The number of miles traveled responding to the same is thirty and one-fourth (30¼) the number of feet of hose laid is ten thousand four hundred and fifty (10450), the number of chemicals discharged is forty-five.

The value of property destroyed during the year is fourteen thousand and eighty-five dollars and forty-four cents (\$14085.40).

The amount of insurance paid on the above losses is nine thousand five hundred and ninety-eight dollars and forty-four cents (\$9598.44). The total amount of insurance carried on property sustaining those losses is one hundred and twenty thousand and one hundred dollars (\$129100.00).

The cost of maintaining the department during the year is six thousand nine hundred and sixty eight dollars and sixty nine cents (\$6,968.69) and was expended for the following purposes: For salaries (three hundred and sixty dollars \$360 00 of which is due to injury to Fireman Kirn) six thousand and twenty-one dollars and seventy cents.

Yearly Synopsis—Total number, 45; Nativity, Am. 31, Afro-Am. 5, Eng. 1, Scotch 1, Welch 2, Italian 1; Dif. Diseases or conditions 31; number of visits 191.

Since the last report one party has been placed in the county house and steps have been taken to have some of the children referred to and the same sent to the Reform school at Adrian. It is hoped that such action will be effective.

It will be seen in the tabulated report that in this department of the city government there have been more patients treated than in the months covered by the last report but fewer visits have been made owing to the different nature of the cases. The results on the whole have been quite satisfactory.

The total expense of this office to the city has been \$111.25. Being unable to find any record of previous years it is impossible to say as to whether the expense is greater or less than before. Care has been taken to make the expense as low as possible.

During the year several cases have applied for treatment whose condition was such as to require the advantages of a hospital. As there was no money provided by the city for the care of such cases at the hospitals, the professors at the heads of the respective departments to which they were assigned and friends subscribed sufficient to keep such patients until they could be cared for outside.

As a city, we are much in need of a place where we can send our worthy sick poor who need hospital care, and steps should be taken to supply one. When the \$25,000 was donated by the city for the erection of a hospital, "to be known as university hospital," no written provision was made for a separate ward or bed to be used by the city. At the time the question was under consideration, jointly by the citizens and members of the Board of Regents of the university, there was a verbal understanding that two beds be set apart for the city's use. It seems that

having the talent, skill and appliances at our command, steps should be taken to avail ourselves of this opportunity and see that some room be reserved for our city's use.
